RCAF Needs More Men and Women

High School Education No Longer Necessary for Air Crew

"The air war is just hitting its stride" is the claim of Flight Lieut. Thos. Fryde, officer commanding the Air Force Mobile Recruiting Unit which will visit here shortly.

"To keep pace with the ever-growing production of planes, the Air Force requires additional thousands of able-bodied Canadians to train for Aircrew. A vast increase in Air personnel is imperative if we are to continue killing U-boats, blasting Nazi factories, and providing protection for our invasion forces," he adds.

"Education", Flight Lieut. Fryde went on to say, "is no longer a bar to enlistment. Mentally alert men, 17 1/2 to 32 years of age, with only the new Grade VIII minimum are now eligible to apply for Aircrew. Suitable R.C.A.F. schooling soon fits such men for interesting courses".

Enlistment Made Easy

The visiting Mobile Unit is a recruiting office in itself. Complete with interviewing officers and doctors, it can commit applicants while quartered here at Town Hall. Those accepted are furnished with travelling warrants to Manning Depots.

The Mobile Unit also accepts applications for enlistment in ground duties, such as Airframe, Aero Engine and Wireless Mechanics, Metal Workers and Carpenters. Those enlisting as Ground Crew will be given complete courses of training with full Air Force pay and allowance.

Women Let Men Fly

Girls with experience who enlist may continue in their own type of work, if they so desire. Anyone trained in driving, typing, stenography, bookkeeping, telephone operating, stockkeeping, and general office work can find the equivalent duty to perform in the Women's Division.

Girls with no specific qualifications may learn to become clerks (operations room), wireless operators (ground), photographers, dental assistants, typists, equipment assistants, etc.

Women between 18 and 45 years of age, with a minimum education of High School Entrance, are eligible for enlistment in the Women's Division of the R.C.A.F.

tion could make Him known to His creatures. His attributes attest His infinite love and concern for the people whom He has created and drawn to Himself.

Verse 7—"That will by no means clear the guilty." Although He will provide a righteous basis upon which He can forgive iniquity and all forms of sin and transgression, it cannot be at the expense of His Justice, nor can He act contrary to the holiness of His nature. Moreover, sin must produce due results, so that men will not lightly go on in evil because He is merciful and gracious. Sin affects not only the individual sinner, but it has effects upon the generations following. This is something so manifest that all must realize its truthfulness, and though some may rebel against it, it is evidently in accord with the purest justice. He who sins against God and his own body is sinning against generations to come.

Verse 8—"Moses made haste, and bowed his head . . . and worshipped." The declaration of the nature and character of God moved the soul of His servant to reverence and stirred his spirit to adoration. This is ever the result of learning to know God as He is. There can be no true worship apart from such a revelation of the divine personality and attributes. All are seen in their perfection now in

For the convenience of the public and to ensure speedy distribution, Ration Book 3 will be issued locally at the distribution centres listed below.

FOUR THINGS TO DO to get your new book

- 1 Fill in the application card—which is the first postcard in your present ration book. DO THIS AT HOME.
- 2 PRINT clearly—do not write—the information required, and sign at the bottom with your usual signature. Follow the method on card illustrated.

TO THOSE ON VACATION

If you are staying at a summer cottage, with friends or relatives, or at a hotel as a non-permanent guest, give your usual or permanent address on the application card.

- 3 Do not detach the card from your ration book. This must be done by an official at the Local Distributing Centre. If already detached, it should be brought in along with your present ration book.
- 4 Persons of 16 years or over must sign their own cards. Cards of persons under 16 years must be signed by parents or guardians. Children under 16 will not be allowed to apply for new ration books, either for themselves or for other members of the family.

the Lord Jesus Christ in whom dwelleth all the fulness of the Godhead bodily.

Verse 9—"Pardon our iniquity and our sin, and take us for our inheritance." Emboldened by the proclamation of the meaning of Jehovah's name and the opening up of the love and compassion of His heart, Moses pleaded for the people, beseeching God to pardon their iniquity and to acknowledge them as His own God heard and answered, as their subsequent history shows.

Verse 27—"After the tenor of these words I have made a covenant

with thee and with Israel." The Lord renewed His covenant with them, although they had failed to keep their part of it, as previously confirmed at the foot of the mountain. The second giving of the law took all this into consideration and provided a sacrificial system, which, while it could not in itself settle the sin question, was intended to typify or foreshadow the propitiatory work of Christ, the only ground upon which a righteous God could forgive sin without violating the principles of justice.

Verse 28—"He wrote upon the

tables the words of the covenant, the ten commandments." It is impossible to separate the Ten Commandments from the Old Covenant, of which they were the very heart. This is declared in many other places. Apart from this moral code there would have been no Covenant at all. God gave His commandments. The people promised to keep them. This was ratified with blood. Because of the inability of sinful man to keep the law, that Covenant has been set aside and a better Covenant brought in sealed with the precious blood of Christ.
