This pile of junk represents the Canada Bus Coach bus which collided with a C.N.R. train at Aldershot near Hamilton, Friday night during a pelting rain. Driver of the bus was Fred A. Smith of Hamilton, whose two children are living with Mr. and Mrs. D. Booth and attend Mongolia public school. Twelve of fourteen passengers were killed in the crash. The children went to Hamilton for the funeral of their daddy early this week. Smith met instant death when the train travelling a mile a minute crashed his standing bus believed to have stalled at the wayside crossing. Besides the wife, five children ranging from 5 to 11 years survive. They include Evelyn and Betty who live at Mongolia.

**Shot Three Dogs, Neglected Evidence**  
 Claiming to have killed three dogs, one in March, one in May, and the third in July, caught killing sheep in Whitchurch Township, a ratepayer made application for the bounty of \$5 per dog, or \$15, only to have the claim disallowed by the council in session on Saturday.  
 It was pointed out that while the council pay a bonus of \$5 for any dog shot caught worrying or killing sheep, it was highly essential that some member of the council or the sheep valuator be called to view the remains, in order to substantiate the claim. This was not done, and council felt they could not make payment without the necessary evidence. The consequences might be that illegal claims be made if once the rule was not upheld.  
 Reeve George Leary was in the chair when Councillor Ed. Logan introduced the matter of townline maintenance in reference to the road running through Gormley. He later introduced a resolution asking Markham council to continue to administer the townline next year, since Whitchurch handled the account for twelve years without a break. Council supported the resolution which brought out some discussion.  
 The reeve said the road was not properly kept, and that sufficient work was not being done in keeping with the enormous travel it has to carry.  
 Councillor Harper said that "our own roads were just as bad until they were gravelled, and Markham hasn't done the graveling yet. "We have worse sideroads anywhere in the township" said Councillor Logan.  
 Deputy Reeve Lorne Evans said there was no doubt but that the townline had been neglected, and it should have attention, but he would like to see Markham continue to administer the account for another year at least. Whitchurch pays half the cost.  
 Councillor Eugene Baker was favorable to continuing as heretofore, and was not adverse to having the road kept in better shape.  
 Tax Collector Ross Rateliff was promised a \$75 increase from \$225 to \$300 for collecting the 1944 taxes. Mr. Rateliff said the work had greatly increased, and that he handled more than \$40,000 annually.  
 "I do not think the collector is asking anything out of the way," said Councillor Logan, and Councillor Harper said Mr. Rateliff was worth all he was asking.  
 Deputy Reeve Evans suggested that the pay be increased \$50, and Councillor Baker said that would meet with his approval, since \$75 looked like a one-third increase.  
 Councillor Harper and Logan then submitted a resolution calling for the \$75 advance and it went through without further opposition.  
 Constable Windsor was ordered to be paid \$36.50 for services during August, and Constable Geo. Dewsbury \$65. Hospitalization for July was paid amounting to \$25.50.

**MOTHER AND DAUGHTER BAKE 1,625 PIES FOR CAMPERS**  
 No matter where you look around Church Hill, farmers are digging potatoes and the crop is a splendid yield. The land is sandy and we get nice clean tubers. Mr. Joe Martin has finished his early potatoes and from a little less than three acres he got 575 bags. Ivan McLaughlin is digging his late tubers. Several of our neighbors bought 300 chicks last spring, but Ernest Lageer purchased 1500. There were 1700 chicks and 100 turkeys to be exact. Then in addition we can report that Mrs. Lageer and her daughter were certainly busy people too. They baked and delivered at the lake some 1625 pies that the campers enjoyed and were glad to get along with the Lageer vegetables. Now the Lageer boys have gone to the bush to help out with the fuel supply for next winter. One has the truck, the other had the saw, while Herb. Beach, Toronto, went along with the lads to the bush which is located west of Toronto. This is just a glimpse of the busy life we lead around Church Hill.
