 ally I feel greater confidence in the outcome of this loan than I did of any of the previous loans."
 Mr. Davis then called on George Mitchell, Willowdale, new member of the legislature for North York, who said that it had been the history of the British empire for centuries to be unready for war.
 "Are we kidding ourselves?" was the topic of an address given by Rev. Henry Cotton, a former R.C.A.F. padre during the war and an airman who was twice shot down during the last war.
 "The man who kids himself along, who puts blinkers on, who refuses to face all the facts, is a liability rather than an asset to himself and to the nation. As we open this fifth Victory Loan it is quite pertinent in my judgment to ask: Are we kidding ourselves?"
 Mr. Cotton quoted German generals, now prisoners of war in Britain interviewed by Beverley Baxter, Canadian-born British journalist, as saying that this war will last for ten years.
 "Let me hurriedly, say that I don't believe it, but let me also add what Mr. Churchill recently said, 'Despite all the good news, the bloodiest portion—make no mistake about that—of this war for Britain and the United States lies ahead of us.'"
