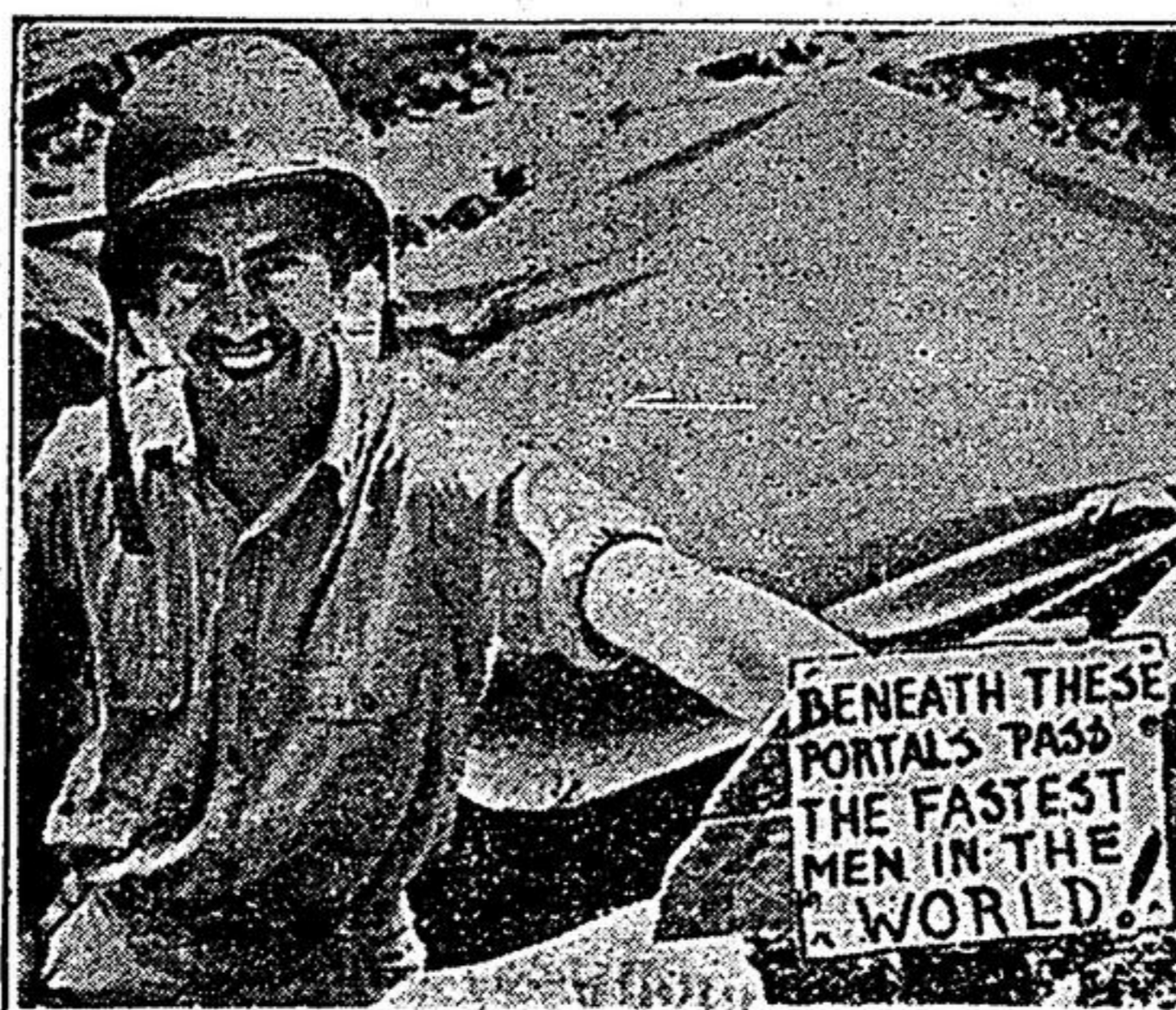
Toxoid Clinic

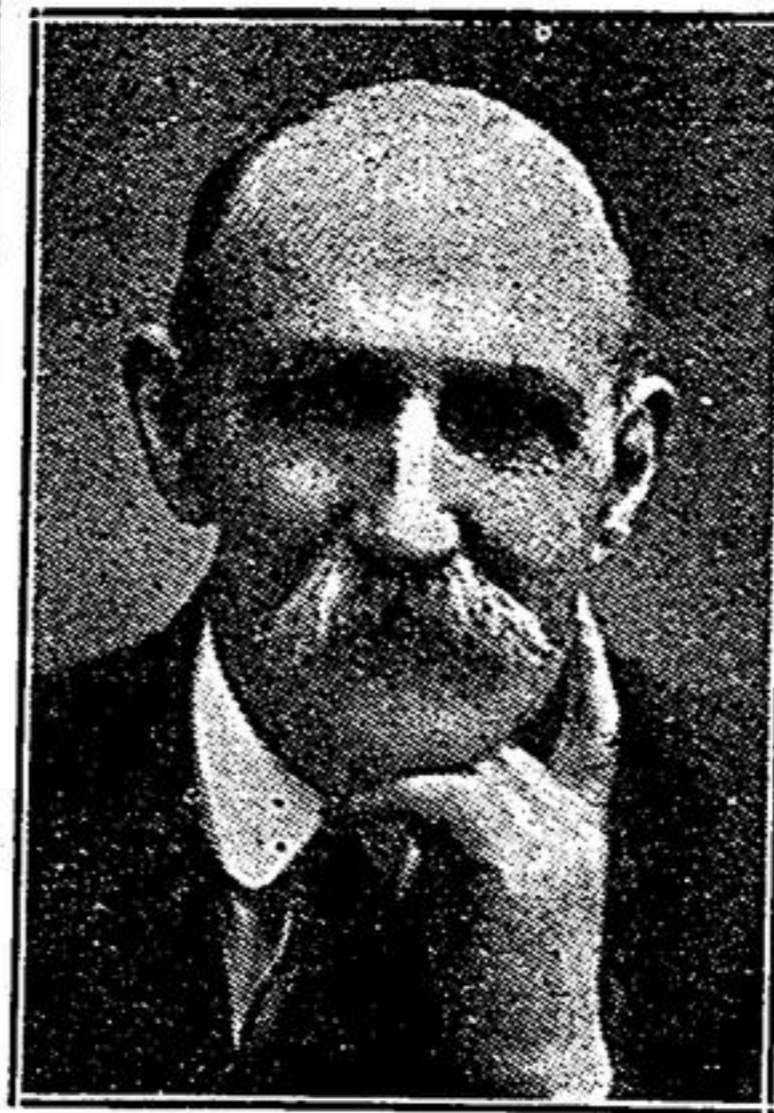

Buy Victory Bonds "SALADA" TEA

PRICE CONTROL AND RATIONING INFORMATION

Typical questions consumers have asked the Wartime Prices and Trade Board this week are answered below by the Central Ontario Consumer Branch Committee.

Q.—I understand the tea and coffee ration was increased recently. Would you kindly explain how we get that extra one-third of an ounce?

A.—Yes, the tea and coffee ration was increased by one-third. However the coupon value was not changed so that you would get exactly the same quantity of tea and coffee for each coupon as you did previously. The increase was given by adjusting the valid dates, that is, tea and coffee coupons become valid every three weeks now instead of every four weeks as before.

Q.—Is there a price ceiling on white sugar? I paid 17 cents for two pounds. Other stores charge 2 for 16c. Why should there be this difference?

A.—Yes, there is a ceiling price on white sugar. You should not pay more for sugar now than you did for the same kind and quality in the same store during the basic period, Sept. 15 to Oct. 11, 1941. You see, each store has its own ceiling price on food items depending on what the particular store charged during the basic period. Before price control came into effect in Dec. 1941, prices always varied from store to store, because of differences in costs, such as labor, rent for the premises, etc. Now, under price control, prices still vary as normally, but they must not advance beyond the level set in Sept. 15 to Oct. 11, 1941. Therefore, the price of sugar is likely to vary one half cent a lb. from store to store. Of course, if you believe the price of sugar has gone up in your store since Oct. 11, 1941, please send particulars to the nearest Price Board office or to us and a check-up will be made promptly. Price increases in some articles have been authorized by the Board in exceptional cases where costs were out of line with the basic period price. If your grocer tells you a price increase has been authorized he must show you the authorization if you wish to see it.

Q.—How do I get a new ration book for my baby?

A.—By presenting the baby's birth certificate, baptismal certificate or an affidavit on the form provided at the office of your Local Ration Board, you will receive a ration book for your baby.
