Growers Elated by Vegetable Prices

One farmer in the Stouffville district is reported to have refused a gold \$10,000 cash for his vegetable crop this fall, while many instances are reported of substantial returns being received for a modest patch of vegetables.

A field of carrots at Goodwood of not very great size realized the grower, Mr. D. McDonald, an even \$900. However, there is a lot of hard and tedious work about growing carrots and too often growers are not properly paid for their investment and effort. A patch of carrots running around two acres on the farm of Peter Sabareta at Ballantree, netted the owner close to \$1000 last week.

The ceiling prices are sufficiently high to allow attractive prices to the growers, since in some instances ceiling prices have not been reached. Turnips are selling from 40c. bushel to almost double that if the grower trucks them to the city for selling. His returns would not, however, be much better than the sale price to be obtained at the farm.

Ceiling prices in Ontario are fixed as follows for vegetables delivered by a grower or shipper to a wholesaler at any distributing centre:

Beets, unwashed, 2 1/2 cents; beets washed and scoured, 2 1/2 cents; cabbage, 2 1/2 cents; red cabbage, 3 1/2 cents; carrots, unwashed, two cents; washed and scoured, 2 1/2 cents; parsnips, unwashed 4 cents; washed and scoured, 4 1/2 cents; turnips and rutabagas, 1 1/2 cents; washed and scoured, 2 1/2 cents.

Vegetables waxed for sale have the same ceilings as washed and scoured vegetables. Only beets and carrots may be weighed and sold with tops on.

Provision is made for wholesale and retail markups.
