YORK BREEDERS PROMINENT AT RECORD-BREAKING HOLSTEIN SALE
 York County breeders bought four head and sold two at the All-Canadian sale, held November 11th, at Oakville, when 69 Holsteins sold for \$71,610, an average of \$1037 each, and the highest ever made at a Holstein consignment sale in Canada, and the highest on the continent since 1920. Montvic Empress Meg, a three-year-old heifer, consigned by York County House of Refuge, brought \$1050; on the bid of E. J. Hosack, Woodstock; and Stanley B. Watson, Agincourt, received \$700 from E. J. Meagher, Oakville, for a year-old heifer. G. E. D. Greene of Agincourt, paid \$900 for a two-year-old heifer, consigned by T. R. Dent, Woodstock, and \$550 for a yearling heifer from Smith Bros., Port Perry. Hon. G. S. Henry, Todmorden, bought a pair of twin heifers calves at \$225 each. These were consigned by

Brown Corporation, La Tugue, Quebec, and their dam went to E. J. Hosack, Woodstock, for \$700.
