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Juvenile Charged Goodwood Thefts

Two pathetic stories were unfolded in Uxbridge Juevenile Court, Thursday afternoon, when two 14-year-old boys, both wards of the Boys' Training School at Bowmanville and one A big bulldozer owned by a Picker- of them now serving a sentence of ing concern, was engaged on the six months in the Ontario Reformatory at Guelph for breaking and entering premises at Morrisburg and committing the indictable offence of farm lane. > Chief Corstable Vesey of Uxbridge informed the court that he had received a call at 4 a.m. on November 9th that a car had been stolen from in front of the United Farmers Cooperative store in Uxbridge and he related that as there hadn't been very much gas in the car at the time, it was found at Stouffville the next day. He stated that a good description had been secured of the person taking the car, which fitted the description of a young boy who had been put out on a nearby farm by the Training School and who had been reported as having run away from this farm. The boy was arrested in Hamilton two days later.


The boy's mother, who was present, suggested that the boy be put in the Working Boys' Home, Toronto, so he could earn some money and make restitution. She claimed that she couldn't make restitution as her husband was overseas. His Honor pointed out that there 'was already a sentence to be served at Guelph, adding that the boy was a ward of the Training School at Bowmanville.

Mr. Brown informed the court that this boy had been committed to the Training School in January, 1942. by Judge Mott, Toronto, on a charge of theft, by breaking and entering. In February, 1942, he was let out on a farm and was returned on July 25 for stealing a bicycle, a rifle and some ammunition; let out again in August, 1942, he took \$75 from the place where he was staying and ran away, coming back to the school in November; let out again, he appeared in Peterboro court on June 7 of this year on a charge of bicycle
