**Warden Reesor
Advocates County
Assessor After War**

"I don't think that we will ever have a perfect assessment, and would favor the appointment of a county assessor after the war," stated Warden William Reesor at Ontario County Council session last week.

The statement came from the warden following the action of the town of Whitby in submitting to the County Clerk for 1943 assessment purposes, the 1941 assessment roll of the municipality which was attacked by Reeve Thos. Harding of Reach Township, who held that as a result the county would sustain a financial loss on account of increased assessment.

Deputy-Reeve J. H. Ormiston in support of Whitby's action declared that the Department of Municipal Affairs was fully conversant with all the reasons and circumstances for the belated roll and had advised the council of that town that nothing illegal was being done. Reeve R.M. Deverall of Whitby said that if the Township had an equalization of its assessment on the same basis as Whitby, the Township would have a much larger assessment than it has today.

"I challenge you on this statement," declared Reeve Harding of Reach.

During the discussion, it was admitted that some municipalities in the County were not complying with the Act respecting the time for returning their rolls to the Clerk, although statutory penalties are provided.

**MARKHAM MAN IS
ASSESSED \$10 ON THEFT
CHARGE AT AJAX PLANT**

**OUTSIDE USERS TO PAY FOR
WATER AT RICHMOND HILL**

Water customers of the Richmond Hill domestic service living just outside the village will have to pay higher rates after the end of the year. They will be charged 70c. per 1000 gallons for the water they use and \$16 per year additional service charge. Residents in the village are supplied at a rate of 35c per 1000 gallons. The reason for the double rates on outside users is explained to come about because they do not bear any of the cost of new installations, whereas residents of the village are paying a levy of 7 mills for new installations.

In Stouffville the installations are entirely met out of earnings. Our water being gravity supply, is able to show profits that permit this happy situation. Water users just outside Stouffville will realize they are getting bargain rates.

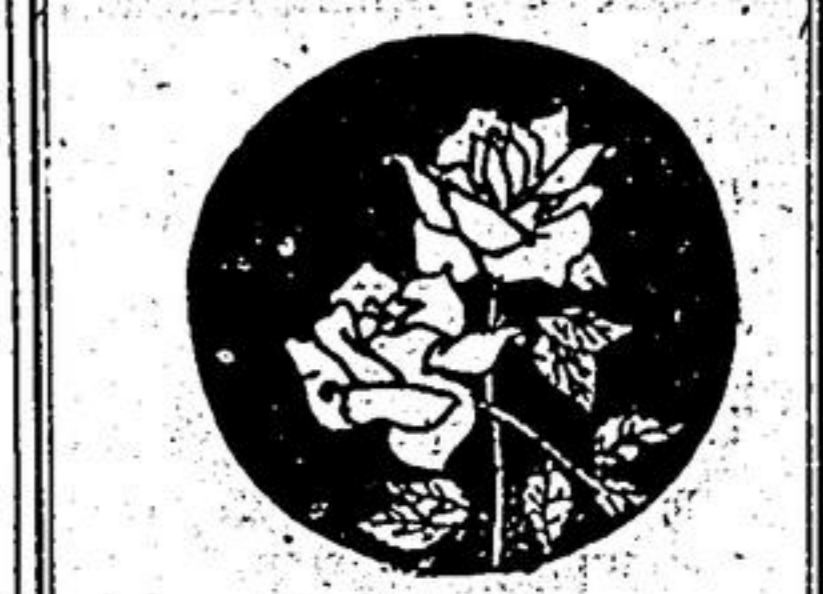

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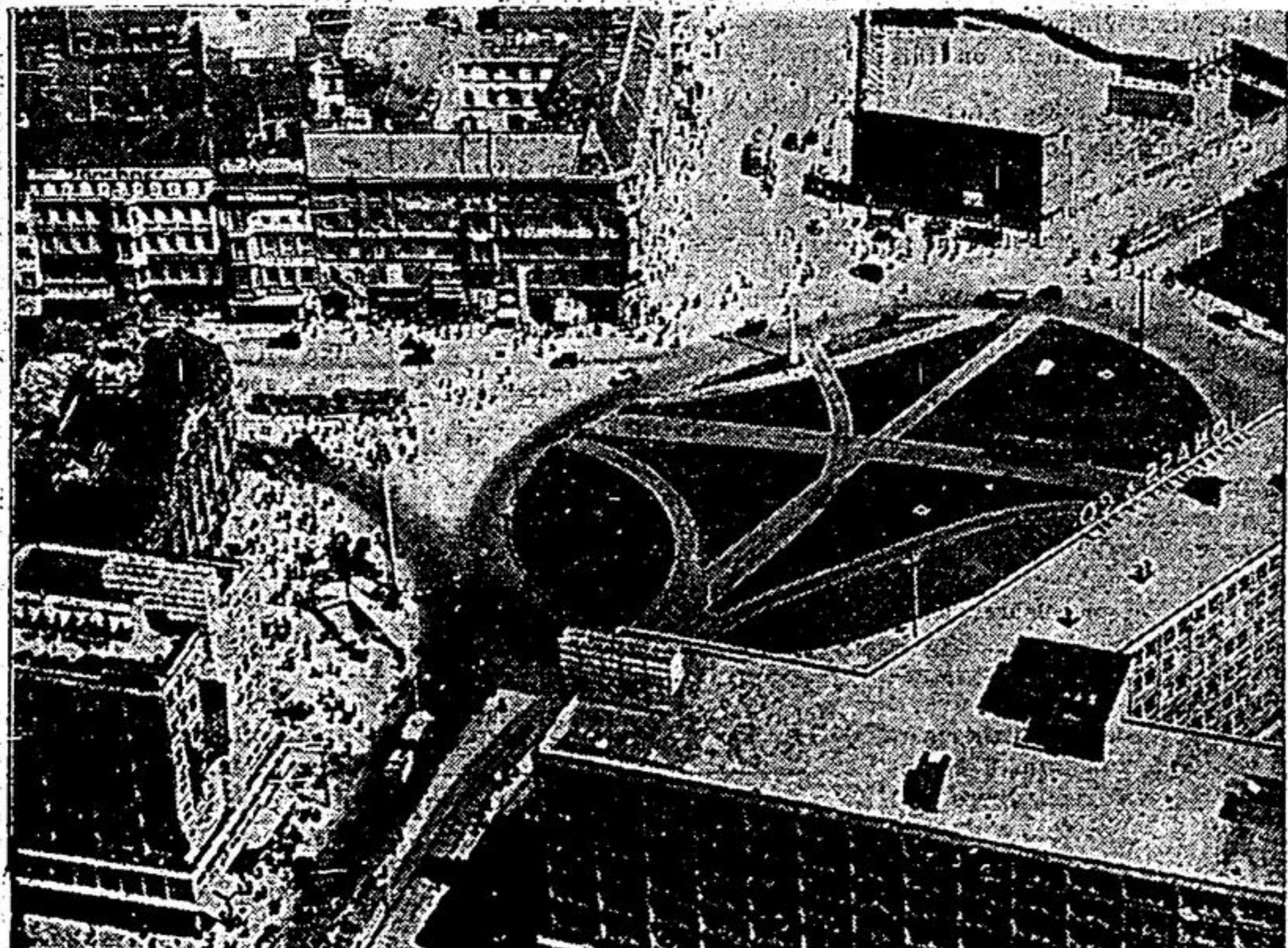
