On one of the week-ends, in fact nearly every week-end, there was an argument with reference to the management of the farm and he was not satisfied with Flowers, with the result that he told him that he was to curtail his expenses and was not to purchase any more feed on credit, also that when he needed any feed to phone him long distance and he would send same from Toronto. On May 23rd, witness said he took away the truck so that there would be no more large accounts for gaso-

At this point, the Crown Attorney produced as an exhibit Mr. Flowers letter of resignation. dated May 24th which was a result of the argument and curtailment of his expenses. However, he did not leave until July 12th, at which time, the witness told the Crown, he had to put him off the
