A BUSY WEEK AT THE LAKEHEAD

Last week was a busy one at the Lakehead. Marine insurance rates started to climb on December 1 and on December 12 insurance will cease for this year. The big lake boats were hugging close to the elevators at Fort William and Port Arthur, with their hatches open and asking for grain. Many of them would make a last run down the Lakes while protected by insurance and then tie up for the winter in the eastern ports on the Canadian and U.S. sides. At one time last week there were 55 boats in the harbour and there was not enough wheat at the Lakehead to fill them all—that is not enough wheat available for shipping. Some wheat is stored there under contract for future delivery.

POSSIBILITIES AFTER WAR IS OVER

The Department of Munitions and Supply is studying post-war possibilities for war plants, many of which can be converted without much trouble. Such new war industries as synthetic rubber production, optical glass, radio equipment (which may revolutionize radio communications and is the basic of television) will continue in peacetime. Expansion will be needed in coal, as Canada imports about 60 per cent of its total needs now; steel will be needed to rebuild Europe; ships taken from our inland waters will have to be replaced. Besides, automobiles, radio sets, washing machines, electric refrigerators and a tremendous number of household luxuries and necessities have not been produced since 1940. The field will be a wide-open one.
