NORTH YORK C.C.F. TO CHOOSE FEDERAL CANDIDATE

A nominating convention of the North York C.C.F. will take place on Saturday, January 29, probably at Aurora. It is announced. Two old-timers in the C.C.F. will be contenders for the federal nomination. Major A. H. Moods senior company commander at North Bay educational basic training centre, who regards Newmarket as home, has belonged to the C.C.F. since 1933.

Kenneth Ross, Mount Albert merchant, has belonged to the C.C.F. since the provincial election campaign of 1934. Born at Mount Albert Mr. Ross has been a general merchant at Mount Albert for the past 20 years. Two daughters are through school and one son is in continuation school.

Mr. Ross has served as a member of the Mount Albert continuation school board, was a candidate for parliament in 1935, for the Ontario legislature in 1937 and a month ago was elected to East Gwillimbury township council.

Major Woods came to live in Newmarket when the Newmarket training centre was established. His wife and two children have continued to live in Newmarket since his transfer to North Bay.

Major Woods is a former secretary of the Magna Charta C.C.F. club in Toronto and a former president of the Humbercrest C.C.F. club in Toronto, was chairman of the West York C.C.F. constituency council and a candidate in West York in the provincial election of 1937. Major Woods held the positions of provincial treasurer of the C.C.F. and business manager of the New Commonwealth.

He is a member of the Ontario council and Ontario executive of the C.C.F. He was chosen by the then C.C.F. leader, the late J. S. Woods worth, to represent the C.C.F. in England during the federal election of 1940.

The riding is held by Hon. Wm. Mulock, postmaster-general, popular member since the death of the late Herb. Lennox.
