YOUR RATIONING W.P.T.B. QUESTIONS

Typical questions consumers have asked the Wartime Prices and Trade Board this week are answered below by the Central Ontario Consumer Branch Committee.

Q.—I attend a bingo game every week at a local church. They have been selling soft drinks at 7c. a bottle and have now increased the price to 10c. with no refund on the bottle... is this allowed.

A.—No, this is not correct... if the soft drinks were being sold recently at 7c. the price cannot be increased to 10c. for the same product... if you are being charged 3c. extra for exactly the same item write to us again giving details and we will have the matter investigated.

Q.—Recently I purchased a "Westclox America" alarm clock and was charged \$2.75. When I unpacked the clock I found a price tag which read \$1.65. Is there a ceiling price on such articles... and was I overcharged?

A.—There certainly is a ceiling price on such articles and you were overcharged. \$1.65 is the maximum price which can be charged for "Westclox America" clocks... please send us the name of your dealer so we may investigate his prices... price ceilings must be maintained.

Q.—I noticed in this column that the ceiling price on onions is 7c. a pound. A week ago I paid 8c. and this week 20c.; is this right?

A.—Definitely no... the price quoted in this column is correct... 7c. a pound is the maximum price for the type of cooking onion which you purchased... as you have given us the name and location of your dealer we have passed your letter along for investigation.

Q.—Is Tomato juice rationed?

A.—No, tomato juice is classified as a canned vegetable. It is not rationed.

The group had a good following here, and it was felt they did a great deal of good to some families. Meetings will be held each Sunday.

CLAIMS FOX BOUNTY

No sooner had the ink become dry on a declaration form signed by Orval Degeer before John Crawford, township clerk of Whitechurch, applying for bounty on three fox hides last Saturday, than Degeer returned to the municipal chambers again with still another fox, freshly killed. The township bonus is \$2.00 per pelt.

Accompanied by his brother, Osborne and Bill and Jim Nesbitt, brothers, all from the east side of the township, the men have spent many hours on the trail of fox, roaming over Whitechurch. The quartette to date have shot 32 foxes, and expect to swell the count considerably if a little snow covers the swamps, said Orval Degeer. "The fox is hard to get because all nature has been in his favor—wind and no snow, Reddy can hear a dog cracking through the underbrush for long distances."

When the men stepped into the township offices on Saturday they were nearing the end of several hours hunt, and the three pelts presented were shot on previous hunts. One was got near Mt. Pisgah church on the 3rd, and two were shot near the home of Ted Hollinger, north of Ballantrae.

Having completed their business at Vandorf the quartette of hunters were enroute home in a car when they decided to look at a swamp east of Vandorf. Immediately they saw fox tracks, surrounding the swamp, then sent in the dog. The fox showed himself to a hunter and fell dead on first shot. It was pelted in a jiffy and the hide was presented for bounty in just one hour from the time the hunters made their first claim.

HELP THE BIBLE SOCIETY

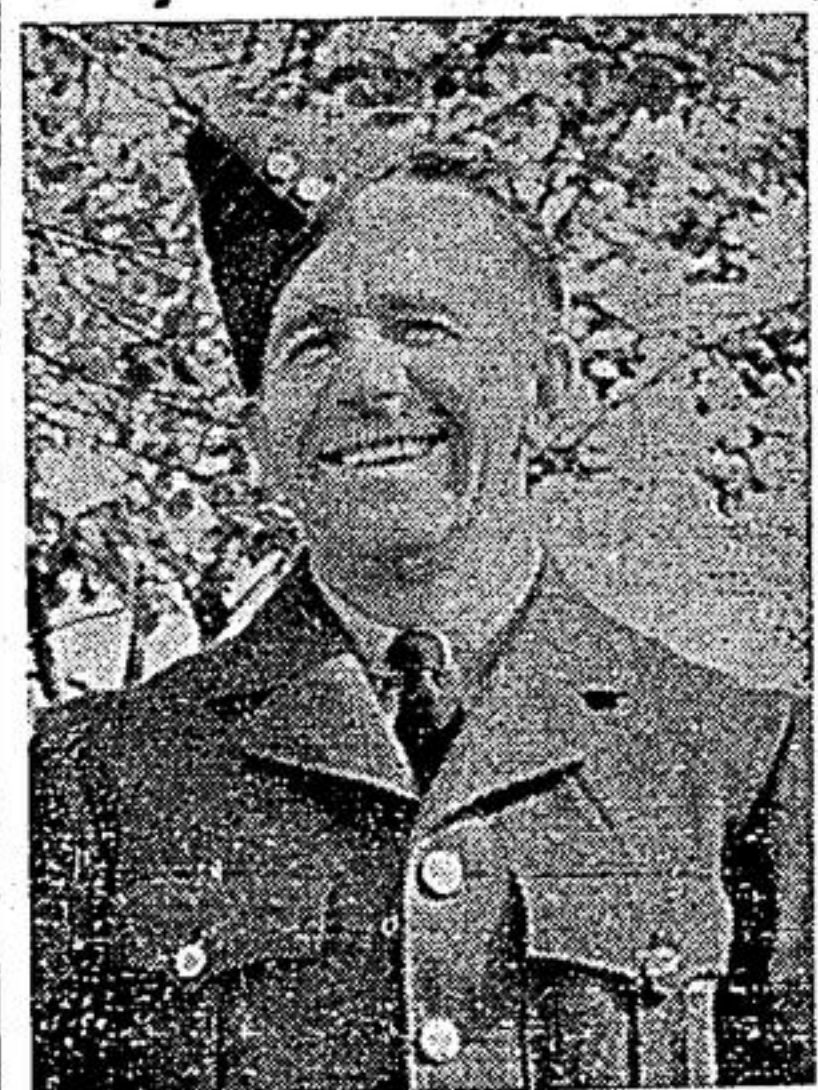
