## B. W. Heise Named Welfare Head

B. W. Heise, superintendent of the Children's Aid branch at Queen's Park, has been appointed Acting deputy-Minister of Welfare, it was reported last week. George Tattle, whom he replaces, has been loaned to the treasury Dept. where he is engaged in important work for Health and Welfare Minister Dr. R. P. Vivian. Until other arrangements are made Mr. Heise who is a native of Stouffville will continue to serve as superintendent of the Children's Aid. While no confirmation could be obtained, it is understood other steps in a reorganization of the welfare department are contemplated by Dr. Vivian. Mr. Tattle, who went to welfare from the Provincial Savings Office, will supervise the carrying out of major changes in the accountability methods. It is planned to combine the work of several departments under one system.

Mr. Heise is well fitted for the post he will be called upon to administer. His whole life has been given over to welfare work, and his ability in this line has been frequently recognized in the position he has been called upon to fill.

## Ken Deacon Heads New Fair Board

Succeeding Mr. John Scott, Claremont, Mr. Ken Deacon was elected president for 1944 at the annual meeting of the Markham Agricultural Society held in Markham village on Monday. Deputy Reeve W. L. Clark is first vice and Col. George Little of Scarborough, second vice-president.

The society during the past year paid off their \$2000 mortgage and removed themselves from any indebtedness, a position they have not enjoyed for many a year.

Gate receipts last year were \$2,131.00 and the society started the year with a cash balance of \$763. Cash prizes of over \$2,500 were paid, plus \$150 for field crop competitions.
