The blame is being placed on some boys who were seen on the street at the time, but no one so far has come forward acknowledging their guilt. Deny Juggling Assessment Figures

Charges made by Reeve Thomas Harding of Reach Township, at the Friday morning session of the Ontario County Council, in Whitby, that for years assessment figures in the municipalities in the county had been juggled, were flatly refuted by several members of the council.

Mr. Harding specifically charged that for a number of years the town of Whitby had submitted for equalization purposes, figures of an assessment roll that was a year behind.

Reeve William Reesor of Pickering, last year's Warden, took strong objection to the charge that there had been juggling of assessment figures. He had served for a number of years on the equalization committee and found it made up of honest, God-fearing men, anxious to do what was right by all municipalities and being guided by the assessment roll figures, as sent in by the various clerks. In his opinion, the only thing the county should do, to rectify present conditions was to have a new valuation made by the county. This, he stated, was done in 1932 and valuations made at that time, and used as a basis since, and were, in his opinion, as fair as they could be made.

Mr. Reesor said that his township would show a \$30,000 assessment gain for the last year and that it expected to pay on it. His opinion was that all other municipalities in a similar position would do the same. Mr. Reesor was of the opinion that no attempt should be made to make any new valuation until after the war. He felt that this year's adjustments could be made in accordance with the figures sent in to the clerk, which would be satisfactory to all concerned.

In reply to a question asked him by Reeve Harding of Reach, as to whether or not he knew that the assessment roll figures sent in to him were a year behind, County Clerk and Solicitor R. Donald Ruddy said that reports received by him were always sworn to by the clerks of the various municipalities, and that he never went beyond that.
