TWO IMPORTANT AUCTIONS NEXT WEEK

Two outstanding farm auctions will be held next week. On Wednesday March 1st the entire stock and implements belonging to Harvey Moyer at Dickson Hill will go without reserve, since the owner has sold his farm. There is a choice dairy herd of fully accredited Holsteins, mostly near due or freshening early in the summer. Mr. Moyer's herd is well known and will be anxiously sought. Sale at one o'clock.

The next day, Thursday, Mar. 2nd the big sale of stock, implements, and house furniture belonging to Edw. Nigh, will commence at 11.30. Melville women will conduct a refreshment booth. The sale is large and must start on time. Like Mr. Moyer Mr. Nigh has sold his farm and everything will pass under the hammer of Auctioneer Farmer without reserve.

ROOT VEGETABLES PRICES STILL ON POUND BASIS

All root vegetables must be sold on a per pound basis whether they are loose or in bunches and with or without tops, the Prices Board has announced, answering inquiries from all over Ontario. "In the case of beets and carrots, sold in bunches with full fresh tops on, the price is still on a per pound basis for the whole bunch including the tops," the statement said. "In the root vegetable class, only beets and carrots may be sold with their tops on and then only if they are full fresh tops. All other root vegetables must be sold without tops."

SUGAR SUPPLIES STILL "TIGHT"

There is no hope for an increased sugar ration nor for increased canning sugar allotments this year, the Prices Board has announced through its sugar administrator, S. R. Noble. The administrator revealed that the world supply of sugar is "extremely tight" and that there are indications of an over-all world shortage.

YORK COUNTY LEADS DOMINION ON HOLSTEIN HONOR LIST

No less than 27 York County Holsteins are prominently mentioned in the Annual Honor List just released by the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada, in which recognition is given to the outstanding producers of the year. No other county in the Dominion approached this total which is rather conclusive evidence that York contains a larger number of high producing Holstein herds than any other in Canada. A particularly noteworthy feature was the fact that 16 separate breeders shared the awards which included 3 class leaders for milk and 3 for butterfat. The top milk producer of the year for the entire Dominion was Susie Korndyke Payne Lass with 28,227 lbs. milk containing 924 lbs. butterfat in 365 days. She is owned by Eaton Hall Farm, King. The highest record for butterfat production in the 305 day division was that of the mature cow, Glen Valley Rag Apple Countess, owned by Rankin C. Kellam, Weston.
