HIGH PRICES AT AUCTION SALE

Cows Sold for \$100 Each at Sale in Pickering Township

CHEESE MAKING ON THE INCREASE HERE

8,693 Pound Increase for February Over 1943 Month

While the make of creamery butter in Ontario County during February was lower than during the same month a year ago there was a very encouraging increase in the production of cheddar cheese.

Figures released by the Ontario Department of Agriculture show there were 61,033 pounds of creamery butter made in the county during February. The make in the same month a year ago was 69,726 pounds. The make for the first two months of this year was 119,724 pounds as compared with 140,595 pounds for the same period of 1943.

The production of cheddar cheese in Ontario county during February of this year was 9,295 pounds as compared with 3,837 pounds in the same month of last year. The total make for the first two months of this year was 20,195 pounds as compared with 5,287 pounds for the same period of last year.

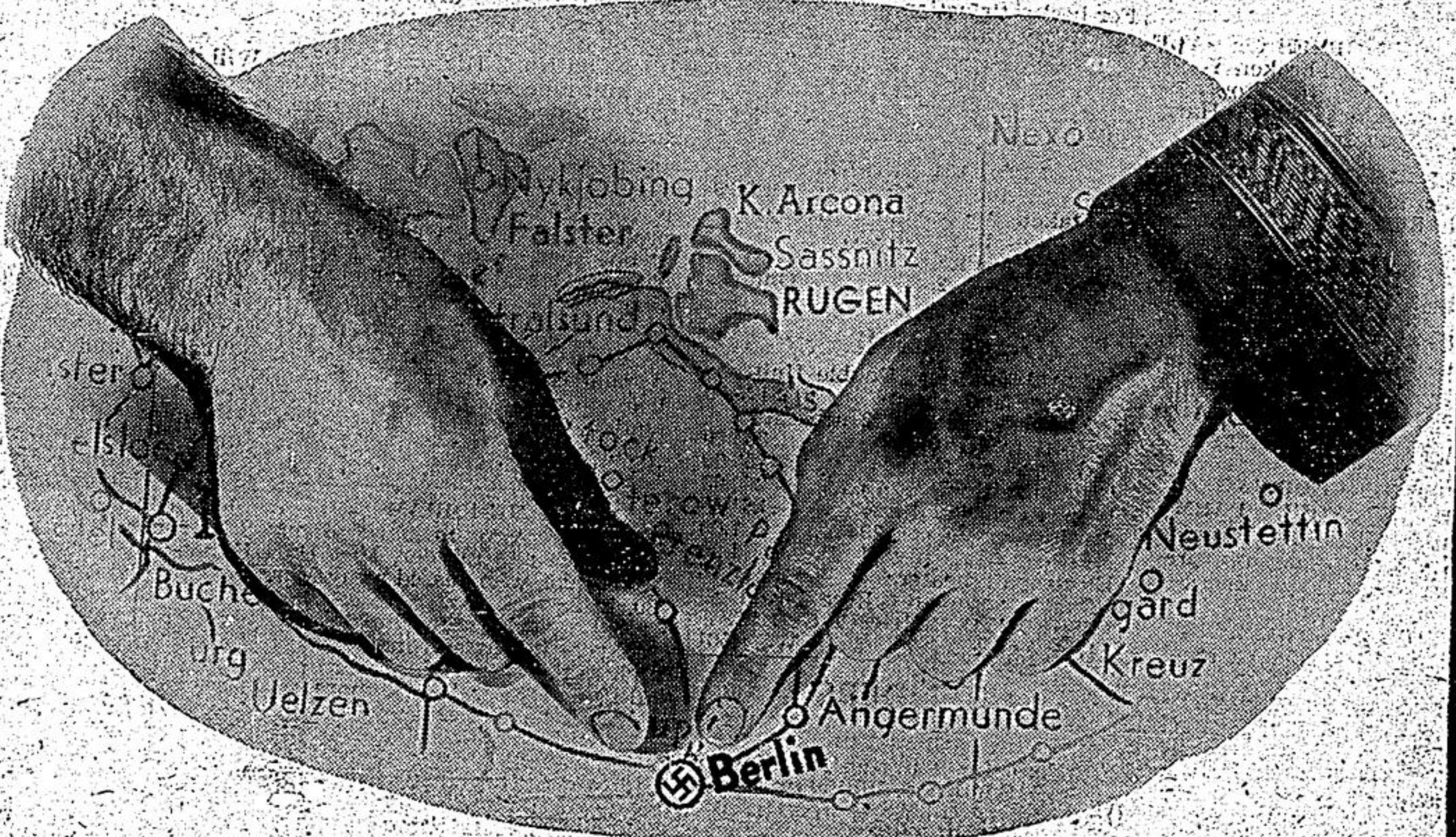
