Belgian Farmers Come Under Knife of Nazis

"In Belgian, as in other occupied countries, the farmer has come under the knife of the Nazis," says the Commissioner for Belgian Information on this continent.

A survey of agricultural production resulted in a set minimum of farm produce for every Belgian farmer. To enforce these orders an army of otherwise unemployables was appointed by the Germans to keep tab on all agricultural production. Despite these precautions it began to be apparent that Belgian pigs seemed to have an unfortunate tendency to die suddenly or disappear....To stop this the Nazis ordered that pigs should be slaughtered only under surveillance and Mr. Norman Urquhart, well-known to keep an even closer check every
