Belgian Farmers Come Under Knife of Nazis

"In Belgian, as in other occupied countries, the farmer has come under the knife of the Nazis," says the Commissioner for Belgian Information on this continent.

A survey of agricultural production resulted in a set minimum of farm produce for every Belgian farmer. To enforce these orders an army of otherwise unemployables was appointed by the Germans to keep tabs on all agricultural production. Despite these precautions it began to be apparent that Belgian pigs seemed to have an unfortunate tendency to die suddenly or disappear. To stop this the Nazis ordered that pigs should be slaughtered only under surveillance and to keep an even closer check every pig was given an identification card.

Cattle too, came in for attention. A census was taken so that the distribution of cattle could be "equalized" as the Germans put it. Farmers with a large herd of cattle would be forced to hand over greater numbers of cows than those who had only a few. When 9,000 farmers of one of the Belgian provinces refused to comply with the regulations their animals were confiscated.

The population of the average agricultural town in Belgium today has its food rations, its rural guards its collectors of farm produce, its cattle controllers, its pig inspectors, its veterinarians, not to mention the political spies and informers. Instead of being the rural community, the farmer is bullied and insulted and stolen from, till it's a miracle that he can produce anything at all.

Uxbridge Council Calls for Completion of Paved Road

The Uxbridge Township Council held the regular monthly meeting on the evening of May 8th at 7.30 o'clock.

The chief subject of discussion was the plans of the survey made on gravel hill, east townline, by F. J. Donovan, O.L.S. of Oshawa. The plans show that by removing approximately 10,000 yards of gravel the grade would be reduced to about six per cent. As soon as the Department of Highways gives its approval to the proposition the two councils (Uxbridge & Whitchurch) will call for tenders for doing the proposed work.

The council passed a resolution requesting the Minister of Highways to give his consideration towards improving the corners at Lincolnville and to completing the paving of Highway No. 47 from Goodwood to Stouffville. This resolution will be presented to the Minister and to the local representatives of Muskoka-Ontario and York.
