Whitchurch Reeves and How They Lined Up

It is interesting to note that since the Township of Whitchurch was incorporated back in 1850, ninety-four years ago, it has had twenty-two different reeves. The first reeve named when the township was incorporated was Joseph Hartman who held the office for ten years, a length of service never equaled by any other reeve to this day. Mr. Hartman when reeve in 1859 became warden of the united counties of York and Peel and with this great honor to his credit he died in Dec. 1859 just at the closing of his biggest year in office.

The nearest approach to Mr. Hartman's tenure of office was made by Herman Kidd who held the position for six years, and by Earl Toole also reeve for six terms and who retired only when he reached the wardenship of York county in 1942.

One John Randall who served back in 1869-1873 was reeve five terms also Morgan Baker who preceded Mr. Kidd.

During these 93 years of incorporation Whitchurch has only had six township clerks. The first man to serve was Geo. L. Porter who was followed by Jos. W. Collins who must have been very capable for he held office at the pleasure of the council for 34 years when he resigned probably because of age. Next in line came J. C. Lundy, W. H. Clarke, Wm. Crawford and the present incumbent John Crawford, the youngest clerk in the county of York but not without a few gray hairs since he became clerk and treasurer of Whitchurch.
