**New Arrangements Sought for Cashing Cheques at Par**

The municipality of Whitchurch is being asked to find a new way to get its cheques cashed at par at Aurora and Newmarket, where the privileges have been enjoyed for years by special arrangements. Stouffville is the "home bank" for the township, but ratepayers on the west side who shop in the Yonge street towns wish to pay their taxes there as well as to cash their cheques received from council at these centres without exchange costs.

With the municipality borrowing very little money any more and the rate of interest being reduced to 4 per cent, the banks cannot carry the township account without some source of revenue, and thus the council is asked to provide some arrangements with banks in these places so that they will accept cheques issued by the municipality or cheques drawn to township credit at par.

The Township of Whitchurch annually has 350 to 400 cheques cashed through the banks at Aurora and about 500 per annum cashed at Newmarket. That is cheques issued by the municipality and cheques deposited in the Yonge street centres by residents of Whitchurch in payment of taxes.

**Jessie Mahon, 82, Buried on Tuesday**

The passing of Miss Jessie Mahon at the Brierbush on Sunday, removed a personage who had long been identified with the district. Miss Mahon was in her 82nd year, but even her close friends never realized her great age. She was a daughter of the late Wm.
