LOCUST HILL CHILD FATALLY INJURED

Robert Eves Ran Out From Behind Bread Truck

Two-year-old Robert Eves, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Eves, R.R. 1, Locust Hill, was fatally injured when struck by a car driven by Flight-Lieut. A. E. Manser, No. 1, R.C.A.F. Training Command, Toronto, on No. 7 highway, one and a half miles east of Green River at 4:10 Friday afternoon.

A bread truck which had been proceeding west, was stopped on the highway and the driver Albert Lahey, accompanied by two small children was at the rear of the truck apparently removing bread. As Manser was passing the truck the Eves child ran out from behind it and was struck by the car.

He was taken to the Oshawa General Hospital suffering from a fractured skull and laceration of the brain and died before midnight.

Dr. H. C. Hall, of Oshawa, was the attending physician and the coroner, Dr. H. M. MacDonald of Oshawa, was called. Provincial Constable George Yuile of Oshawa, investigated the accident.

It has not yet been decided if there will be an inquest.
