### Wish Gratified to Die in Native Ontario

When Mrs. Cynthia Ferrier Hart became seriously ill at her home in Cleveland, Ohio, she expressed the desire that she might be spared to return to her native Ontario. Steps were immediately taken to remove her to Stouffville where she would be near her sister Mrs. Will St. John just east of town and near her native village of Green River. She was just on her fifth day here when the end came, on Sunday, July 16, but her fervent request had been granted. Mrs. Hart was in her 78th year and died at the Brierbush Hospital.

Born at Green River, a daughter of pioneer farmers Mr. and Mrs. Obediah Peter Ferrier, Mrs. Hart whose christian name was Cynthia, was one of a family of eight, and four are still living to revere the memory of a beloved sister, they are Rev. Harvey Ferrier of High Bluffs, Man., and John M. Ferrier of Providence, R.I. also Mrs. Will St. John, Stouffville and Miss Martha Ferrier at Green River, and who is 83 years of age.

It is over 40 years since Cynthia Ferrier went to the U.S.A. where she married the late Frank Hart. She became an active social worker and was for years identified with the Central Friendly Inn, a worthy social organization. She was a member of the Methodist church, and a power for good in Cleveland until of course her health forced her to relinquish this work.

The funeral this Wednesday afternoon from the home of her sister Mrs. Will St. John proceeded to Locust Hill cemetery for interment.
