ADJUST SHEEP CLAIM.

shall be made within ten days by the valuator to the council."

Councillor L. J. Harper said they must have got ten days and ten months mixed up.

Mr. Clark said he should have made the award for the whole six sheep last fall.

"No," said the reeve, "you can't value sheep never found. You don't know whether they were killed or stolen."

Mr. Clark, "I have Mr. Emerson's word about the sheep and there is only one chance in ten thousand that the two never found were stolen. I firmly believe they were chased into the swamp by dogs."

Councillor Harper—"But you can't take an oath to the effect that they were killed."

Reeve Leary said further that the onus was on Mr. Brodie to produce the sheep for the valuator. This could not be done and he asked Mr. Clark to amend his valuation so as to claim for the four killed of which carcasses were produced. This was done, and council then agreed to waive the time limit on filing the report, and the matter was settled on motion of Councillor Logan and Deputy Reeve Evans.

Mr. Brodie's claim was \$60 for the four sheep killed, plus \$10 flock damage, total \$70. Another claim made by Mr. Clark on behalf of George Dreury compensated the farmer for a heifer attacked by dogs, one of which was a big brute from Newmarket section. The farmer was allowed \$35 for his animal.

Alfred Hartwick, Stan. Gilbert and Walter Hoover appeared before the meeting asking that a winter road be provided on side-road first north of Vandorf at lot 19. Children walk three miles to school and no plowing done to help them. Council promised to look into the matter with a view to setting up the road so that the plow could operate in winter.

Council decided to take no action regarding a new statute whereby municipal employees may be placed under the Workmen's Compensation privileges. By an amendment passed last session in the Legislature the benefits of the Workmen's Compensation Board were extended to all employees of municipal corporations which heretofore were limited to certain parts of their operation only. Under Sec. 88 of the Act, however, municipalities are given the right to apply to the Board to bring their operations under schedule which is operated as a collective liability system. Contributions annually are made on a percentage basis of the pay roll. In this way, says the Workmen's Compensation Board, the employer is protected against serious liability for accidents to his employees.

Various rates of assessment apply. The present rate charged municipalities is \$2 per \$100 of pay roll. Rates for School Boards is only 30c per \$100. Rural trustee boards are not to be included in the scheme.
