Markham Gunner Hits Nazi U-Boat

The crew of "L for London," Wellington bomber in the R.C.A.F. Demon Squadron of Coastal Command, including W.O. J.E. France of Markham village, attacked a German submarine in the Bay of Biscay recently and circled the area long after it had submerged, but saw no trace of it, the R.C.A.F. command has announced.

"L for London" spotted the U-boat in the haze after reaching the patrol area.

"The minute I saw it I knew it was a Jerry so we got ready for an immediate attack," said the pilot, F.O. Fred Foster, 21, of Vancouver, who was on his 39th patrol.

W.O. J. E. France wireless air gunner, jumped to the rear turret and scored repeated hits as the plane passed over the sub's conning tower. He fired 400 rounds.

France saw depth charges enter the water and straddle the U-boat which stopped, remained surfaced for ten minutes and opened fire in an attempt to shoot the Wellington out of the sky, Foster took evasive action and kept his plane from being hit.

Foster was a Nanaimo, B.C., bank clerk. His three W.A.G.'s—Godin, France and Andrews—saw service in the Middle East before joining the Demon Squadron, but the attack marked the first time they had fought a Nazi submarine.
