## Aurora Asks Aid Paying for Signal

Reeve Chas. Sparks, a delegation of two other citizens of Aurora appeared before Whitchurch Council on Thursday evening making a formal request for financial assistance to install a 4-light signal system at the eastern entrance to that town over the C.N.R. tracks near the old mill on the suburban road. Mr. Sparks outlined the dangers from poor vision at this crossing and said the total cost for electric signal system would be \$3,800 with an annual upkeep of about \$300 per year. As many Whitchurch farmers travel this road the delegation suggested the township bear part of the cost. Reeve Sparks pointed out that Aurora's share of the installation cost would be in the neighborhood of \$350 with upkeep charges annually of about \$45. He suggested that Whitchurch bear half the cost levied against Aurora.

No action was taken by Whitchurch council on the ground that a similar situation arose at Stouffville where that municipality paid their own costs without help from outside, and that right in Whitchurch several level crossings present a similar danger and ere long the municipality may be called on to install signal systems of their own.

Deputy Reeve Evans said, "We have so many crossings equally dangerous although not with the same amount of traffic as going into Aurora, hence it would not be wise for us to contribute in this case."

Councillor Ed. Logan said he thought a signal at the Aurora crossing would be a good idea, but he viewed the situation the same as the deputy reeve respecting the township's participation in the cost.

Councillor Les. Harper said Whitchurch will be confronted with similar situations and the township will certainly have to bear their own costs.

Reeve Leary couldn't see where Whitchurch had any responsibility and in view of the problem outlined he thought council took the right course in deciding against participation in the cost of a signal

## Mrs. E. Leary Once Gormley Teacher

The passing of Mrs. Edward T. Leary at her late home, Gormley, on Saturday, Sept. 2, culminated an illness of about a year. Thirty-five years ago she came to Gormley as a school teacher and married Mr. Leary, brother of Reeve Geo. Leary, who survives her together with three daughters Mrs. Albert Allan (Gladys) and Audrey and Marie also one son Jack, and one brother Archer Gillies, Toronto. She was in her 71st year and was highly esteemed in the community. At one time Mrs. Leary was actively engaged in the activities of Mt. Pisgah United Church and was made a life member of the W.A. ## Some Felt the Earth Quake Here

The earthquake which shook Ontario from a sound sleep about 1.45 a.m. on Tuesday morning was felt by quite a few in and about Stouffville. No damage was occasioned, of course, although some people were quite frightened by the tremor which lasted for several seconds.

One man told us he jumped out of bed and looked around the room for the cat which he was sure had pounced on his bed. Another young man ran downstairs and declared to his parents sleeping on the main floor that someone was under his bed. The old folks didn't feel anything, so they thought the son was dreaming. There was the odd case too, where couples had not taken their departure from an evening together, and in one instance at least it shook a chap into the realization that it was time to go home.

Some folks report the shock so real, that it shook pictures and glassware in the house, while still one man told us that he jumped out of bed and closed the window, thinking that a heavy storm was getting up. That was out Gormley way. All in all the great majority of those people contacted admitted that they did not know anything about the quake until the next day.

## Booze Owner Pay Fines in Newmarket

Pleading guilty in Magistrate's court in Newmarket on Friday, to charges of illegal possession of liquor, Clifford Leslie Munro, Richvale, Ont. Gordon Genoe, and Fred Genoe, both of Toronto, were each fined ten dollars and costs, or one month in jail.

In the case of the last two mentioned, Constable Aubrey Fleury told Magistrate W. F. Woodliffe he had searched the accused men's car in Whitchurch township at 11 p.m. on Aug. 18th, and found in its trunk, a part bottle of whiskey, a quart of beer and a number of empty bottles. He stated that Fred Genoe admitted ownership of the whiskey and Gordon Genoe, the beer.

Township Constable Jos. Foote, told his worship that he had searched the Munro car at 11.10 p.m. on Aug. 12th, at Wilcox Lake and found a case of beer. The defendant admitted ownership.

### W.P.T.B. QUESTIONS

Typical questions consumers have asked the Wartime Prices and Trade Board this week.

Q—Recently I bought a bedroom suit and after it was delivered I found it to be unsatisfactory. Can the dealer be forced to take this furniture back and either refund my money or give me other merchandise.

A—Under a Board order stores are permitted to refund money or to give credit for articles returned within 12 days if they are unsatisfactory.....there is nothing, however in the regulations requiring merchants to do so.....If you were overcharged we will be glad to have the dealer's prices investigated.....if the furniture is unsatisfactory and the store refuses to make any adjustment then it is a matter of common law.....suggest you consult a solicitor.

Q—My son is going on the six weeks excursion to the west. Must he take his ration book along?

A—Yes, he must take his ration book with him.....it should be turned over to the people for whom he will be working and where he will be receiving his meals in order that they may secure rationed foods for him. When he leaves for home his book will be returned to him.

Q—Last week I purchased half a gallon of cider vinegar and was charged 24c. A week later at the same store I was charged 28c. Was I overcharged?

A—The store should not charge more for vinegar than was charged by them during the basic period, Sept. 15th to Oct. 11th, in 1941.....24c sounds about right for half a gallon.....and 28c, a bit high.....as you have given us the location of this store we will have their prices checked immediately.

Q—In shopping for a new fur coat I was offered one labelled simply "genet." The clerk was vague as to what type of fur it was, but thought it was wild cat. Can you tell me what it actually is?

Q—"Genet" is the commercial trade name for dyed or natural cat. It is illegal for a furrier to offer fur coats unless they bear tags showing both the trade and correct name of the fur used. As you have given us the name of the store it will be investigated.

Q—My daughter rented two rooms which were very poorly furnished and pays \$16.00 a month \$1 for gas and electric light. The landlord has now removed the furniture and will not allow her to heat water for washing. The rent is still the same. Should the rent be reduced?

A—Yes, as the landlord is not going to supply the services, furniture, etc., which were originally agreed on when the rooms were rented to your daughter she may apply for a reduction in rent.....apply to the Rentals Administration, 330 Bay St., Toronto giving all details and they will furnish the necessary forms.
