Stouffville Minister To Preach in Historic Church

The historic United Church at Almonds near Whitby associated with the Whitby pastoral charge under Rev. Clifford Park, will celebrate over a century of history at special services on Sunday. The afternoon service will be conducted by Rev. Martin Jenkins of Pickering, and the evening service at eight o'clock by Rev. Edgar Morton of Stouffville.

History records that the late James Almond, after whom the church was named, built it about the year 1838. There had been, however, a congregation worshiping at Almonds before that and it is figured in the absence of accurate records that Sunday next is the 103rd anniversary of the church.

The present building, it is reckoned, has been in use for about 90 years, and is little changed from the day it was finished by the strong hands of pioneers, who it is reported, contributed free of

charge their labor and brought the timber from the woods. It has, however, during the past few weeks been redecorated inside and out, and electric lights have been installed.
