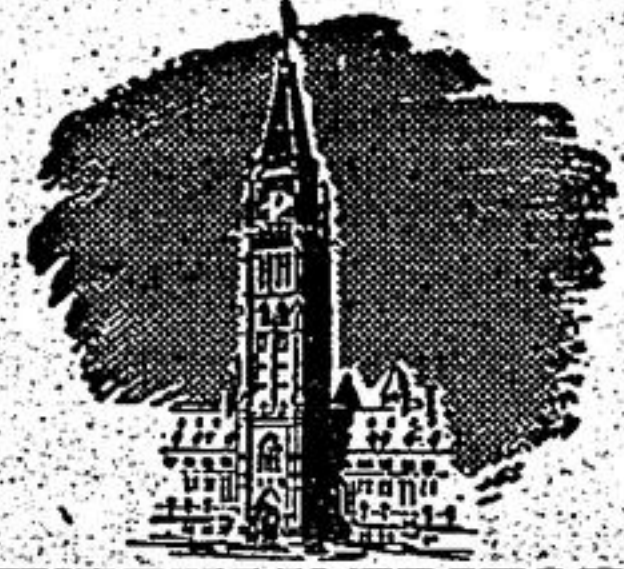
### H.M.C.S. KOOTENAY CREW ARRIVE HOME

### A WEEKLY EDITOR LOOKS AT Ottawa

Don't ever underestimate the lowly cob of corn! While the greater part of the harvest of 600,000 acres planted to corn each year is fed to livestock and poultry for the production of meat, butter, cheese, milk and eggs, Canadian industry used over ten million bushels in the production of soap, laundry starch, baking powder, rayon, leather, textiles. Too, it is used in explosives and the sugar content converted into alcohol, some of which is a constituent of anti-knock gasoline. So you see corn products are used everywhere from the supper table to the battle-front.

Further evidence of the reduction in the tempo of the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan is seen in the amalgamation of the R.C.A.F. Training Command Headquarters. The headquarters of No. 1 Training Command at Toronto and No. 3 Training Command at Montreal are to be consolidated and the new organization will administer all R.C.A.F. training schools in the Maritimes, Quebec, Ontario, and up to the head of the Lakes. No. 2 training Command Headquarters at Winnipeg and No. 4 Training Command Headquarters at Calgary are also to be merged with the new organization, headquarters at Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan, administering all western Canada flying training.

Closing of actual air schools has already been announced and further reduction in the operative number may be expected.

Only the United States, Russia and the United Kingdom excel Canada in the output of steel, our plants having doubled their overall output since 1939. We produce shell steel at the rate of 200,000 tons a year. Our industries had no

### Gravel 80c a Yd. in Uxbridge Twp.

The Uxbridge Township Council held its regular monthly meeting on Monday, Oct. 9th at eight o'clock in the evening, all members present.

After the minutes were read and confirmed the clerk read to the Council a memo. from the newly formed Municipal Health Services Board in which was outlined the plans for establishing health services by the municipalities. The members of the Council discussed the proposals at some length, but decided to take no action at present as it was thought that the County Council might have some plans in connection with the scheme.

The Road Superintendent reported that the average cost of the gravel taken from the Gravel Hill, crushed and placed on the roads in the Township, was slightly over 80 cents per cubic yard, and that the value of the improvement to the road would reduce the actual costs to below this figure. He also reported that up to the present time he had been unable to arrange for securing gravel crushed and placed on the roads on the Eastern side of the Township.

Road account No. 10, amounting to \$2,022.39, was passed for payment and general accounts of \$218.90.

The next regular meeting of the Council will be held on Saturday, Nov. 11th at one o'clock.

previous experience in making armour plate, but this didn't stop them from meeting all requirements for tanks, armoured vehicles and some naval purposes.

A recent report of the Canadian Meat Board indicates that the average dressed weight of beef carcasses marketed in Canada has grown from 460.4 lbs. per carcass in 1939 to 509 lbs in 1943, and to an average of 522 lbs. to date in 1944.

The department of Agriculture is authority for the statement that hog production in Canada has passed its peak, or had on June 1, 1944. At that date, the number of swine on farms in Canada was 7,740,880, which was five per cent below that of June 1, 1943, and a decline of 32 per cent is indicated in the number of swine to farrow in the fall of 1944.

Statistics may get dry but for rural readers this should have some interest. The Dominion Bureau of Statistics estimates that Canadians in 1944 will consume 17 per cent more fluid milk than in pre-war days; 20 per cent more cheese, and with the exception of butter which is rationed, an average of 19 per cent increase of all dairy products. Of all meats, 32 per cent more is being used by civilians than before the war; eggs 27 per cent more, canned vegetables about 18 per cent more and dry beans up by 67 per cent.

New advances in dietetic care have been inaugurated in military hospitals by the Royal Canadian Medical Corps. It was found that the lack of desire to eat while recovering from wounds was causing loss in weight and strength, and lengthening the period of convalescence. Now a diet to which doubles the protein intake and increases by 70 per cent the caloric content is served, and in addition a carefully balanced "milkshake" supplements regular meals twice daily.
