### GAS STATION IS FINED \$50.00

Illegally selling graded gasoline to a customer who turned out to be a special investigator for the Wartime Prices and Trade Board, brought a fine of fifty dollars and costs of \$2.75 to A.E. Gray, Aurora, in Magistrate's court at Newmarket on Friday. The defendant, who pleaded not guilty to the charge, was given an alternative of one month in jail for his worship, Magistrate W. F. Woodliffe.

Questioned by Mr. N. L. Mathews, special prosecutor of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board, Mr. William J. Johnson, also of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board, testified that he had visited the defendant's service station on Yonge St. in Aurora, on Sept. 19th and purchased three gallons of gasoline. The witness said he gave Mr. Gray a loose coupon bearing the number 76803, which number was not that of the license of his car. He said that the defendant took the coupon and put it in his pocket.

Mr. Johnson went on to say that he returned the following day, identified himself and asked to see the defendant's coupons. He was given ten sheets upon which coupons were pasted and among these was the coupon with the number 76803. He also found thirty-one coupons endorsed in lead pencil and eight coupons not endorsed.

Questioned further by Mr. Mathews, Mr. Johnson stated that the defendant told him that he did not recall taking the coupon 76803 from him.

"I've tried to run my station in a legal way," stated the accused in his own defence. "If this coupon was given to me I have no knowledge. I guess I didn't watch closely enough."

Asked by his worship what fine he thought adequate, Mr. Mathews said that he was inclined to think that the defendant had been careless in looking after the coupons rather than deliberate in breaking the law. He was therefore willing to consider a minimum penalty.

"I am inclined to think that you have just been careless," his worship, told Mr. Gray. "You are however making yourself liable to a severe penalty. I am being lenient with you. But if there is a repetition I will not be so lenient."
