Mrs. Earl Foster and Mrs. Dudley Foster spent a few days last week with Mr. and Mrs. Donald Morton and family of Oakwood.

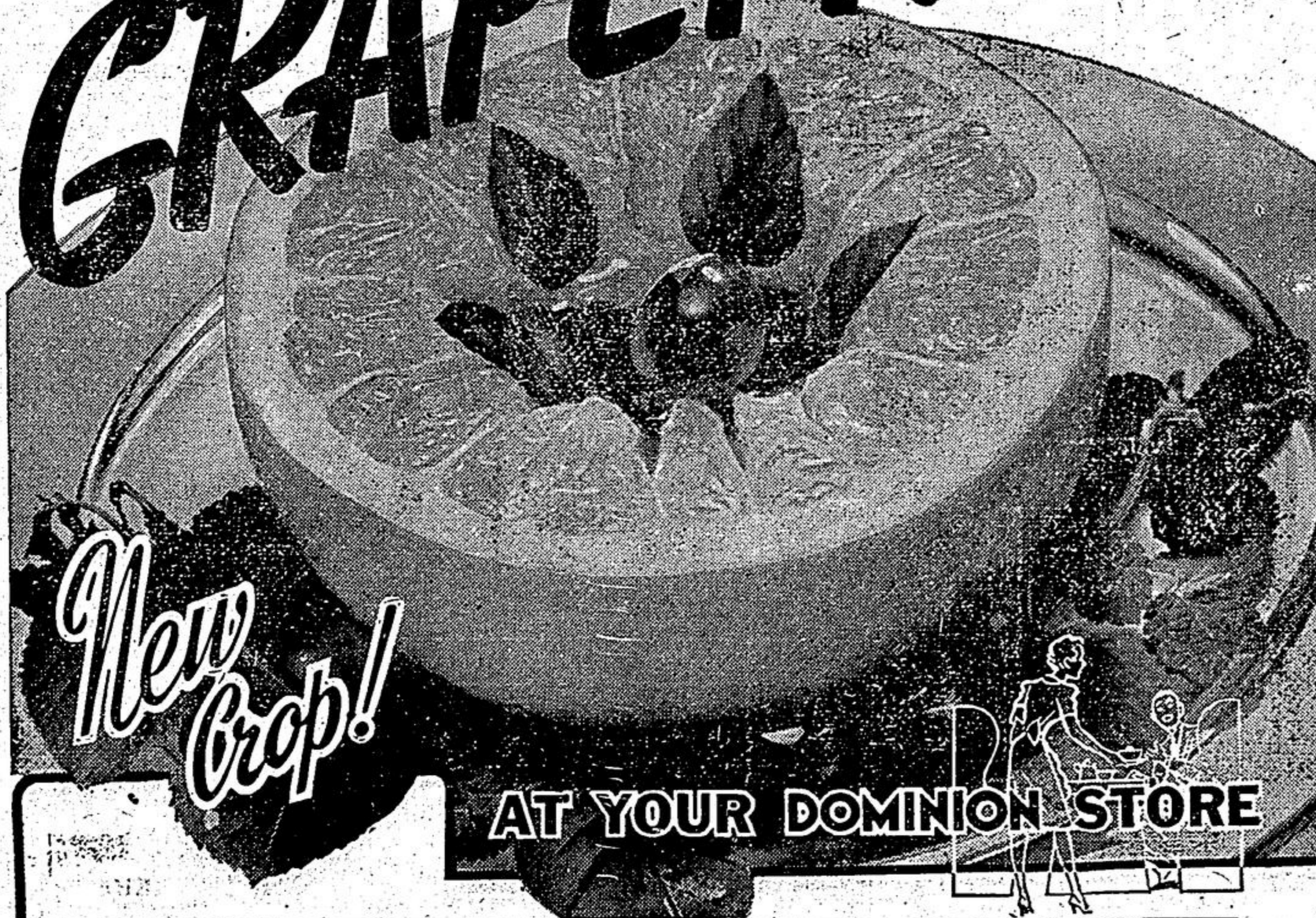
Several from this district enjoyed the splendid musical programme at Gormley on Sunday evening.
