## Uxbridge Passes Election Bylaw

The Uxbridge Township Council held its regular monthly meeting on the afternoon of Saturday, Nov. 11th, all members present.

Minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed, and a number of communications were presented to the council.

The Road Supt. reported that the appropriation for road expenditure for the present year was almost exhausted, and council decided to ask approval from the department for a supplementary appropriation as considerable road work was still unfinished.

Council passed the usual Bylaw to authorize the holding of nominations and election of a council for 1945. If a vote of the electors is required the same officials will conduct the election at the same polling places as in the election last January. Nomination meeting will be held on Friday, Dec. 22nd and election on January 1st, 1945.

The council passed road account No. 11 amounting to \$1229.80 for payment, and general accounts of \$187.02.

The council will hold its last regular meeting of the current year on Dec. 15th, beginning at ten o'clock a.m.
