Robert Sabiston Dies After Long Illness

Funeral service for Robert Adamson Sabiston, who died at his home in Unionville, on Dec. 12th, 1911, after a long illness, was held at the residence, Rev. H. MacCormack conducting the service.

Mr. Sabiston, formerly a wholesale manufacturer of horse clothing in Toronto, came to this community in 1914 and purchased the farm on No. 7 highway, which has been his home since that time, from Joseph and Joanna Eckardt, this farm being one of the original Eckardt holdings settled in 1794.

Although deeply interested in the work of the United Church, of which he was a member, and in all public projects, he took no active part, being of a quiet and retiring disposition, but his high standard of life has exerted much far-reaching influence through his family and the lives of the men and boys employed on his farm and with whom he came in contact.
