Robert Sabiston Dies After Long Illness

Funeral service for Robert Adamson Sabiston, who died at his home in Unionville, on Dec. 12th, 1944, after a long illness, was held at the residence, Rev. H. MacCormack conducting the service.

Mr. Sabiston, formerly a wholesale manufacturer of horse clothing in Toronto, came to this community in 1914 and purchased the farm on No. 7 highway, which has been his home since that time, from Joseph and Joanna Eckardt, this farm being one of the original Eckardt holdings settled in 1794.

Although deeply interested in the work of the United Church, of which he was a member, and in all public projects, he took no active part, being of a quiet and retiring disposition, but his high standard of life has exerted much far-reaching influence through his family and the lives of the men and boys employed on his farm and with whom he came in contact.

He is survived by his life partner who was formerly Miss Laura Eckardt, a direct descendant of the Eckardt pioneer family, 3 sons, Campbell, Donald and James, three daughters, Janet, Mona and Mrs. Joan Tidy, besides one sister, Mary living in Toronto.

Interment took place in Unionville Lutheran cemetery, the pallbearers being Campbell and Donald Sabiston, Eckardt and William Mitchell, John Young and Charles Woodley.

SIR WM. MULOCK LEAVES MR. KING \$50,000

Hon. W. P. Mulock, postmaster-general of Canada, has applied to the surrogate court of the county of York for probate of the will of Sir William Mulock, K.C.M.G.

The estate amounts to more than \$2,500,000, consisting of the following assets: Real estate, \$441,422; mortgages, \$25,816.48; stocks, \$630,604.14; bonds, \$1,372,073.42; cash, \$85,689.44; book debts, \$44,327.40; miscellaneous property, including household goods and effects, \$12,458.83.

The will provides for the setting up of trust funds in the amount of \$200,000 each in favor of the deceased's daughters, Mrs. Edith M. O'Flynn and Mrs. Ethel Kirkpatrick, with provision for their children after their decease.

The will further provides for a legacy of \$50,000 to Prime Minister Mackenzie King, Sir William's friend of many years' standing.

The will directs payment of legacies to the deceased's grandson, Hon. W. P. Mulock, M.P. for North York, of \$200,000; to his son-in-law, Col. A. E. Kirkpatrick, of \$80,000; to his granddaughter, Mrs. Marjorie Hignett of London, England, of \$25,000; to his nephew, Homan Lount, of \$25,000.

The will makes provision for an annuity to the deceased's housekeeper, Miss Rosamond Pratt, of \$1,200, and for legacies to the deceased's gardener, James Clark, of \$6,000; to his chauffeur, J. Holden, of \$6,000, and to Miss Isabel Poustie of \$4,000.

After providing for trusts and legacies, the residue of the estate is devised to Hon. W. P. Mulock. No provision was made by the deceased in his will for charities.

It is estimated that the large estate will pay succession duties of slightly more than three quarters of a million dollars.

This is a portrait of Pte. Ernest Alvia "Smoky" Smith of New Westminster, B.C., who is the first private to win a Victoria Cross in this war, taken shortly before he went overseas with the Seaforth Highlanders. Since his daring exploit in holding an important bridge-head against a German tank assault he has been dubbed "Canada's one-man army." At a private investiture His Majesty King George VI presented "Smoky" with the V.C. saying "Here's a little present from me to you." He is the second soldier from New Westminster, B.C., to win the V.C.
