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Charged with Failure to Parade

When Magistrate W.F. Woodliffe resumed court again on Friday, four youths members of the Queen's York Rangers, whose names appeared on the docket, were charged with being members of the militia and failing to attend parade on November 2nd, 1944, without lawful excuse. Two of the defendants, Murray Judge, 17 years, of Oak Ridges, and Clifford Linstead, 19 years, of Sharon, were found guilty and fined five dollars and costs or five days each. The former pleaded not guilty and the latter pleaded guilty.

Captain William Hunt, adjutant of the Queen's York Rangers told his worship that both youths joined the militia in 1943, and belonged to the unit "C Company" of Aurora. He stated that previous to the November second parade, orders for the parade had been issued by Lieut. C. H. Reeve and himself and posted on the bulletin board in the Aurora Armories. In both cases the youths had given no excuse for not attending the parade.

In his defence, Murray Judge stated that he had been working at Guelph at the time and was unable to attend the parade. He had written his mother to write a letter to his commanding officer and ask if he could be excused.

Asked why he did not write the officer himself, the accused could not give an answer. He admitted that he did not attend any parade since November second although it is held every Tuesday.

"I might say that you are liable to a fine of five dollars for each parade you miss," Magistrate Woodliffe told Mr. Judge. "You must attend every parade unless you produce a reasonable excuse. I understand that the officers of the militia are very easy on the members if they produce a reasonable and good excuse. But you must get in touch with them, you just can't miss of your own accord. Because your commanding officer is asking that the minimum fine be imposed I am fining you five dollars and costs or five days."

In the case of Clifford Linstead, the accused admitted that he had neglected to attend parades for a year previous to November 2nd. He said that he had a market garden to take care of and that when he sold his car he had no means of transportation to Aurora.

Captain Hunt told his worship that he had interviewed the defendant in June and when the latter told him that he did not have enough gasoline for his car and the tires were in bad condition making it impossible for him to travel to Aurora, he himself got in touch with the Oil Controller and made it possible for the accused to get extra gas coupons and purchase tires.

"I find that the officers have been lenient and reasonable with you, but you were not reasonable with them," Magistrate Woodliffe told the youth.

The third defendant charged with failing to attend parade was Orval Thompson, East Gwillimbury, whom Crown Attorney Arleigh Armstrong recalled had been sentenced a few weeks previous to the Guelph Reformatory in connection with a theft of tires.

"O, yes, he came up before me, he's at the Guelph University now," his worship commented with a smile. The charge was withdrawn.

The fourth defendant charged with failing to attend parade was John Mulock Brown, Aurora. In this case the defendant was given a remand until Tuesday, the next court session day.
