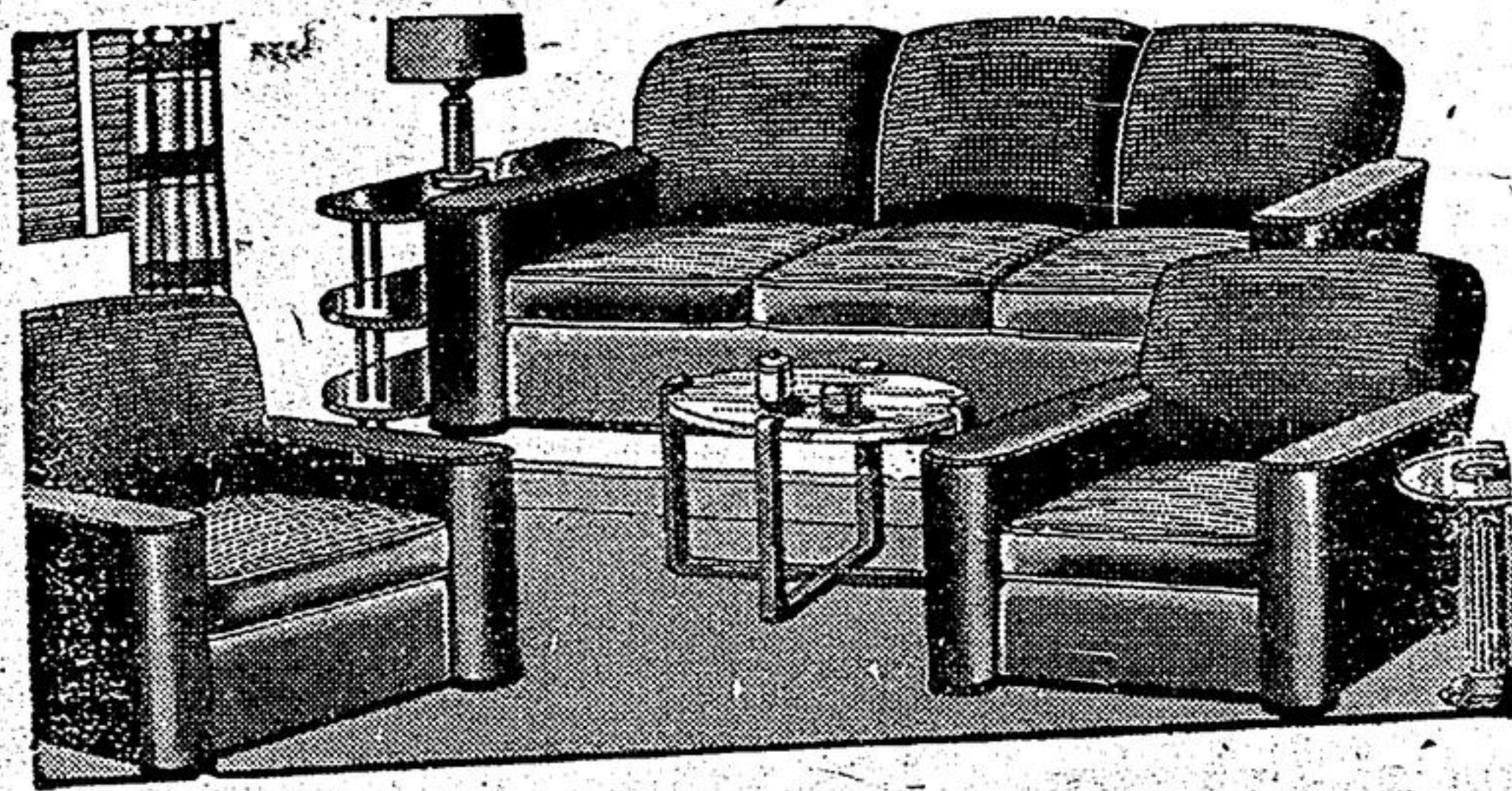

BOMB KILLS GENERAL



Lt. Gen. Sir Herbert Lumsden has been killed by a Japanese air attack Jan. 6 while aboard a U.S. warship in the Pacific it has been announced by the war Office. Lumsden, appointed by Prime Minister Churchill as his special representative to Gen. MacArthur's headquarters in November, 1943, presumably was killed during the invasion of Luzon Island in the Philippines when Japanese planes heavily attacked the U.S. convoy.

The reported increase in the U.S.A. is much greater than in Canada. Total Canadian consumption for 1944 is estimated at twelve billion cigarettes. The heavy excise on cigarettes in Canada has tended to restrain consumption.
