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Brougham Defeated 4-3 in Overtime

Whitby Intermediates battled through to a 4-3 overtime decision over Brougham "Bears" Friday night in Uxbridge to move up into second place in the S.O.H.L.

The Whitby team were paced by defenceman Walt Brown who scored the hat trick. After a scoreless first period Brown countered midway through the second frame on one of his now famous shots. In the overtime session Brown added two more timely tallies. One was scored in a similar manner to his first goal while the last one which won the game was a backhand off Willis' pass that gave the Bearcat goalie, Boadway, little chance.

In the dying minutes of the second stanza Derusha combined with Harper to tie the score. After only a minute and a half of play in the third frame Art Bradley pushed Whitby out front again when he tallied on a beautiful solo rush. The Bears were not behind for long though for at the 5:40 mark Clark unassisted goal made it 2-2. The rest of the period was a sea-saw battle with plenty of action in both ends. Harper's boarding of Art Bradley resulted in a fight and both offenders were thumbed off by referee Max Reesor for five minutes.

Both sides made desperate efforts to break the tie but were unsuccessful. The main reason for this was the standout goaltending of both netminders.

In the extra period Brown's two goals, one at 2:01 and one at 7:30 gave Whitby their victory. Brougham's efforts to counterattack were not fruitless; however, as Harper scored unassisted at 8:02 but the time ran out before he could score again. For Whitby the stars were Brown, Willis, Art Bradley and Al Bradley, while for the losers Derusha, Harper and Simpson played a standout game.

CEDAR CREEK SCHOOL COMPLETED

The Cedar Creek School, east of Claremont has been completed with the exception of bricking, and the teacher and pupils have taken up their new quarters. The new building which replaces the one burned down last fall, is plastered and insulated, and gives much greater warmth.

Dental Survey Being Planned

Commenting on the annual report of the Board of Health for Pickering Township, Medical Health Officer, Dr. N. F. Tomlinson stated that a Dental Public Health survey would be undertaken in the township about April of this year. It was hoped he said to increase the number of complete physical examinations for school children, and to increase the infant welfare work.

The report showed the township with a population of 5,348. The total expenses of the Board of Health were \$2,629.60 of which \$1850 was for salaries and \$235 for treatment and control of disease.

Three epidemics were recorded during the year with the following number of cases, 31 cases measles, 28 mumps, 43 of whooping cough and 1 death from infantile paralysis.

There were 103 school children received diphtheria toxoid, 21, scarlet fever, 277 small pox and 103 whooping cough. Twenty-one schools are served by the Public Health Nurse, Mrs. Gordon, and these have an enrolment of 915 elementary pupils and 67 secondary pupils. The Continuation Schools in the township received a test for tuberculosis.

There were 370 home visits made by the nurse, and 67 classrooms inspected for communicable diseases. A number of physical defects were found, and corrections given.

Since the beginning of the war the tonnage of freight carried by the railways in Britain and the average length of haul have both increased so that the work done by the railways measured by net ton miles has risen by about 40 per cent.

Pickering Township to Purchase Two New Trucks

Set Road Appropriation at \$42,000 for This Year.

At a special meeting of Pickering Township Council held at the municipal building on Monday, it was agreed that two new trucks should be purchased. Both are International make, the one a K7 model, to cost \$3,588, and the other a K11 model to cost \$7,222.76.

This latter model is a heavy truck to plow snow, and both will be fitted with dump boxes so that they may be used for gravel hauling in the summer.

As stated at previous meeting by Road Supt. Ward, the present township truck and grader has seen a record number of hours' service, and it was imperative they should be renewed and augmented by some more satisfactory snow-plowing equipment as soon as possible.

The road appropriation total for 1945 was set at \$42,000 which is an increase of \$14,000 over the appropriation of last year. The figure set was made up as follows, road construction \$3,500, bridge construction \$2,800, machinery \$12,200, superintendence \$2,500, maintenance and repair \$21,000.

Fifty per cent of this amount is borne by the Dept. of Highways.
