## SAYS RUSSIA FIGHTS LIQUOR WHILE ONTARIO BOOSTS SALE

"The expenditure of \$200,000,000 a year for alcoholic beverages in Canada has reached the proportion of big business, and is of national concern," Dr. J. P. Wilson, Richmond Hill, told the North York Temperance Federation convention in Aurora United Church. "The time has come to see if we are getting value for our money. What about the cost of hospitalization, upkeep of jails, loss through motor accidents and the loss of human lives as a result of this expenditure of money?"

A resolution called on the government of Ontario to abolish all women's beverage rooms permanently. Another resolution asks for a county local option law, similar to that of the present municipal local option. The convention will ask that the teaching of total abstinence be made a subject for public schools.

Dr. Wilson was returned as president and Harry West, vice-president. The honorary presidents are Dr. J. S. Boyd, Newmarket, and J. M. Walton, Aurora. Rev. H. E. Wellwood was returned as secretary-treasurer; Miss E. M. Starr, convener of childhood and youth; Rev. Gordon Lapp, convener of law and legislation; and Mrs. P.F. Winch, convener of membership and finance.

## Skate Enters Jaw of Player During Brougham Game

Oshawa Junior "Bees" maintained their grip on second place in the South Ontario hockey league race, when they defeated the Brougham Bearcats, 3-1, in a spirited tussle at the Oshawa Arena Monday night, in the second game of a double-header.

What might easily have been a fatal accident but fortunately proved only painful and serious, occurred late in the third period, when Bathe and Mackey sandwiched a Brougham player at the Oshawa defense. The Brougham player went up into the air and he and Mackey went to the ice in a pile. In the collision, the Brougham player's skate struck Mackey, a young Whitby, member of the Oshawa "Bees", in the side of the neck and the skate pierced right through into the mouth, touching the tongue.

Mackey fell to the ice and in a few seconds, the ice was blotted with blood as Mackey bled profusely. Fearing that an artery in the neck had been severed, Mackey was rushed to the Oshawa General Hospital but after receiving medical attention, which included several stitches, he was able to return home.

Todd of the Brougham team was also an accident victim in this game, receiving a "shiner" when struck in the eye with a puck or stick. As for the game itself, the Oshawa "Bees" earned and deserved their win. They were hard-checked by the spirited Brougham boys, who fought in determined fashion for every loose puck. However, Oshawa's edge in speed and smart passing gave them the necessary margin to build up a 2-0 lead in the first period. They made it 3-0 in the second stanza and it wasn't until the dying seconds of the game that Reesor scored in DeRusha's pass, to save Brougham from a shutout.

Elliott, Wales and Hicks were the Oshawa goal-getters, with Bradley, Smuth and Mackey all playing star games as well as earning assists. Bob Hicks, recently discharged from the army, made his appearance with the "Bees" last night and should prove a very valuable addition. He showed flashes of real speed and scoring ability last night, Goalie MacMillan once again turned in a sparkling display in the Oshawa nets. He stopped Brougham's final bid for a goal too, but he failed to smother the rebound and Reesor lifted it into the top of the net.

## W.P.T.B. QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q—I am enclosing a list of prices charged at two different stores in the town where I live. Is one grocer allowed to charge so much more than another?

A—You have listed the prices charged at a large cash and carry store and at a small grocer's... it is quite possible that there would be this difference in prices... on many articles the individual store is allowed to charge the maximum price charged by him for the same article during the basic period, Sept. 15 to Oct. 11, 1941. The stores where customers are given credit, merchandise is delivered, etc. generally charge a little more to take care of these expenses.

Q—The present conditions in the living room and kitchen of my duplex warrants redecorating but we cannot obtain any satisfaction whatever from the landlord. Must we continue to live in this dirty place?

A—There is no rental regulation which says you must live any place... nor is there any regulation which says the landlord must redecorate unless this is definitely set out in your lease... this is a matter which must be settled between the tenant and landlord.

Q—I have always paid my hairdresser 65c for doing my hair. Recently she has put up a card saying all rinses are to be 25c extra. These rinses have been included in the 65c price up until now. Is she allowed to raise prices like this?

A—No... she must not raise her prices... a hairdresser is not permitted to charge more for the same service as was charged by her during the basic period, Sept. 15 to Oct. 11, 1941.

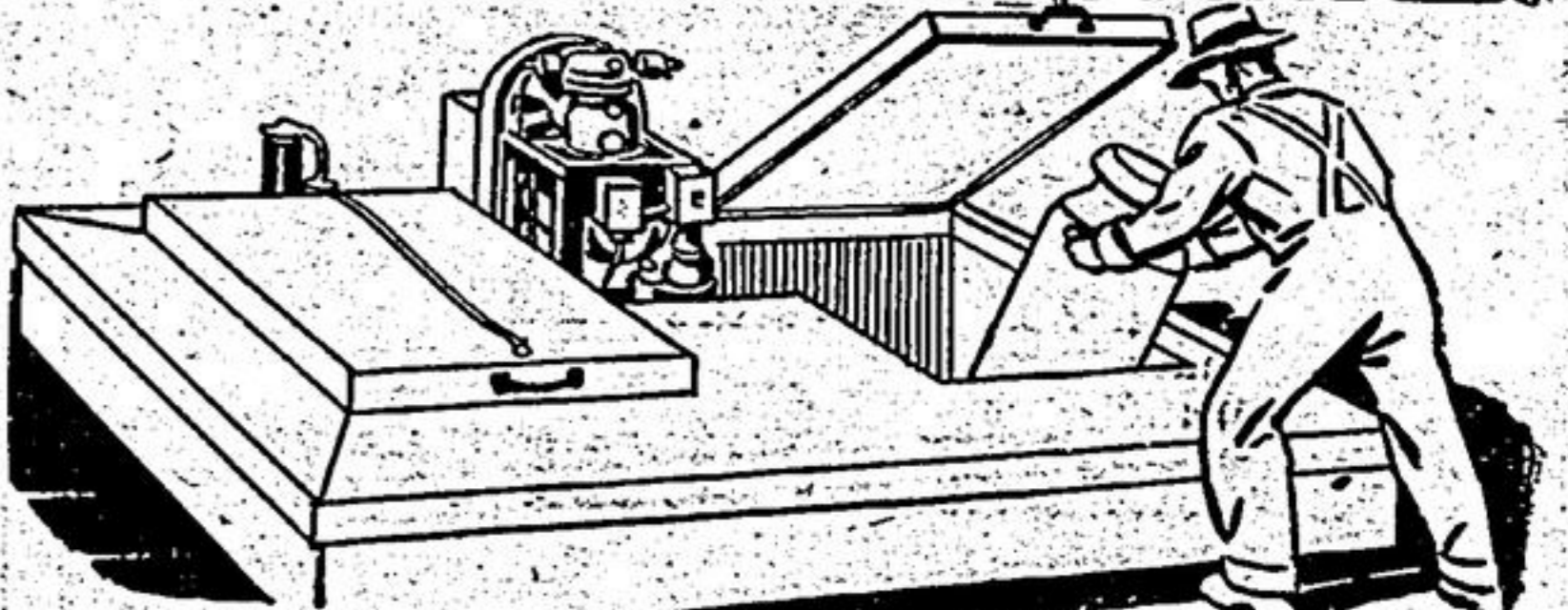
Q—Recently several grocery stores in my town have received shipments of dates. Since they have been so scarce the townspeople are glad to get them and are being asked very high prices. One store is selling at 22c a lb. and another at 24c. Are they allowed to charge any price because dates are so scarce?

A—The scarcity has nothing whatever to do with the ceiling price... however, the stores in your town are not overcharging... 24c a lb. is the maximum which can be charged for the dates which have just arrived in Canada so one store is selling at the ceiling price and the other one a little below.

Q—I bought a gas stove for \$21. cash which was guaranteed for three months. When delivering

A—The question of repairing this stove does not come under the regulations of the Prices Board... it is a matter to be adjusted between you and the store where the purchase was made... if you are unable to make a satisfactory adjustment you should consult a solicitor.
