# Was Prisoner of War Three Years

Three and a half years overseas, and prisoner of war in Germany since Dieppe raid, Aug. 19, 1942, Pte. Kenneth John James, son of Mr. G. M. James, 173 Wolverleigh Blvd., Toronto, returned home on repatriate ship Gripsholm last week. His wife Mrs. Patricia James, bride of two weeks when he went overseas, lives at 42 Fenwick Ave. and has worked at General Engineering Co. Scarborough, since her marriage.  
Pte. James spent thirteen months in shackles. He was with the Royal Hamilton Light Infantry and was wounded four times by shrapnel. He was released on account of illness, and may have to spend some time in the hospital in Toronto.  
Kenneth worked on the farm of Russell Johnston, 9th concession, Markham, prior to enlisting, also worked around Goodwood where he is well known.
