Ottawa, April 11—Royal Canadian Mounted Police headquarters said today that the wartime order making a permit necessary for the possession of a rifle or a shotgun has been rescinded.

A permit still will be necessary for possession of wartime trophies brought from overseas, such as automatic rifles, machine-guns or submachine-guns.

NATIONAL REVENUE

As it's getting along to the time of year when people start reaching for the aspirins and their income tax forms, this week's government department is National Revenue—a department responsible for collecting income taxes, excise taxes, duties and customs duties. It maintains 151 customs-excise posts and 19 district income tax offices throughout the country.

It does a pretty efficient job of hauling in the shekels, and because it does, half our war costs are paid for out of taxation. Of course everybody knows how taxes have gone up, but did you know that in the year ending March 31, 1939, only \$142 million was paid in income tax, while last year collections ran up to \$1,635 million?

Those extra pennies you pay on soft drinks, cigarettes, chocolate bars, chewing gum, etc., ran up to \$673 million last year, compared with \$165 million before the war. Even customs duties increased, though imports declined, from \$89 million to \$187 million!

Needless to say, the number of people paying income tax has gone up, too, from 526,000 to 2,600,000! And it has taken more people to sort and check and receipt the tax returns: 1,312 in 1939 and 5,390 today!

W.P.T.B. QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q—I live in the country for the summer months. From May to Sept. last year I paid 37c a pound for butter. When I went down for a few days at Easter the same store charged me 38c. Has butter gone up in price since 1944?

A—No butter has not increased in price stores are allowed to charge the maximum price charged by them for the same brand of butter as was charged during the basic period Sept. 15 to Oct. 11, 1941. Before WPTB regulations came into effect butter always sold at a lower price from July to Sept. or Oct. during the winter months the price has always been slightly higher to take care of storage charges this practise has not been changed by the regulations. No doubt when you return to the country in June you will find this store selling butter at 37c again.

Q—The landlady where I board has given me a week's notice to move. I thought I was entitled to six months' notice. I pay board by the week. How much notice should I receive?

A—If by boarding you mean you get your meals where you live, and pay your rent by the week, your landlady needs to give only a week's notice to vacate.

Q—Is there a ceiling price on the cost of having a negative enlarged? I took a negative to a well-known store and was charged \$1.50 for a 7 x 9 enlargement. I now find I could have had it done at another store for 35c.

A—The price of such work is controlled by the Prices Board each operator is entitled to charge the maximum price charged by him for the same type of work during the basic period, Sept. 15 to Oct. 11, 1941. While \$1.50 seems quite high there is a great difference in quality for this type of workmanship and the first store mentioned may be one where exceptionally fine work is done and where they charged \$1.50 during the basic period. If you could furnish us with more particulars we will be glad to check his prices.

Q—I have ordered several articles from catalogues only to receive word back that the mail order house was out of the things I order. Why do they advertise the articles in the catalogue if they can't supply them?

A—Quotas for mail order houses are on the same basis as quotas for other retail stores the mail order house would have a supply of merchandise at the time the catalogue was printed, but as thousands of these catalogues are mailed out all over Canada no doubt their supply had become exhausted before your orders were received you will very often find a retail store sold out of some article you saw advertised in the daily papers.

Tighten Machinery Ration Rules

Farmers are urged to continue to repair and keep in operation farm machines which they already own and are strongly advised to consult their nearest farm equipment rationing officer before disposing of the machinery they now own, with the thought of replacing it either immediately or at some later date.

Abuses in the distribution of farm machinery have necessitated an amendment to the Wartime Prices and Trade Board Order No. 347. The present provisions make it plain that, if a person disposes of machinery which he owns and is of a class or type which is

rationed with the thought of replacing it later, without first having consulted the farm machinery rationing officer for his district, his application for new equipment will not be considered. A number of cases have been reported where the farmer finished some particular operation early in the season, sold his equipment to a neighbour, and later made application for new machinery, stating on his application that he had no machinery of that type.

Farm equipment supplies for Canadian farmers are equal to those being made available to American farmers in relation to the output in both countries during the years 1940 and 1941. In both the United States and Canada, however, the supply which can be built under existing circumstances falls short of meeting the demand.

ECLIPSE OF SUN ON JULY 9

Canadians will be scanning the sky, through tinted glasses this coming July 9. On that day, provided they are early risers, they will witness an eclipse of the sun, the first since Aug. 31, 1932, and the last until June 30, 1954. Watchers living in Saskatchewan and Manitoba will have an advantage over residents of other provinces, for the eclipse in its total phase will be visible within a strip of 40 or 50 miles wide. Other parts of Canada will see the eclipse, but only partially. The path of the total phase will originate with sunrise west of Butte, Montana, at 6.15 a.m., E.D.T.
