It is not generally known in this country but it is recognized properly backstage in Ottawa that, though much publicity has been given to Canada's delegation at the world security conference at San Francisco, still other Canadians, with much less publicity, have played a most distinguished role behind the dramatic deliberations that had taken place to create a permanent world court of international justice under the set up of the Dumbarton Oaks scheme. Indeed, one of these Canadians, John Read, K.C., head legal adviser in the Department of External Affairs in Ottawa, was Chairman of the drafting committee of world jurists, and others,

such as Hon. Phillippe-Brais, K.C., widely known as the President of the Canadian Bar Association, and Hon. W. B. Farris, Chief Justice of Columbia, were most prominent in these history-making deliberations. The importance of these Canadian efforts to help in the creation of ground work for this new world court cannot be overestimated at this critical time, even if it may not be properly publicized due to its technical nature or if these men did not possess the same news value as political leaders at this Conference. Moreover, the new world court is expected to be much stronger than the last such institution at The Hague to which the United States did not belong and Soviet Russia had deserted or left, with this new court's functions involving, among other things, interpretations of treaties as well as international laws or obligations and rights, violations of such treaties or laws, and so forth, all of a delicate nature and vital in the preservation of peace in the world of to-morrow.

the dissolution of Parliament so that, in practice, this may or may not be the actual date of the first gathering of the new Parliament. It will depend entirely on the desire of whatever party is in power after the election and the conditions existing at the time.

Stories have been widely circulated across Canada that the Federal Government in Ottawa could have proclaimed at any time a holiday for the day of the declaration of the conclusion of the European war but information in the capital appears to reveal that until the exact date of the end of the war in Europe was disclosed, a specific day for a "V-E" holiday could not have been fixed by the authorities on Parliament Hill, especially since it is no secret that Canada would want to act in this respect in the same manner as the other United Nations. In Canada's capital, "V-E" day has been looked upon as a

day not merely of celebration but of solemnity, with religious services being stressed, more than expressions of mere exultation or noisy rejoicing, because relatives and others of those Canadians killed in this World War II do not feel inclined to any other attitude.

the SHOUT that became a whisper

We've looked forward a long time to celebrating the installation of our millionth telephone. Now the great day has come and gone, with only a brief press notice to mark its passing. There are more important things to do just now. Besides, we can't forget that 70,000 further applicants are today waiting for telephones.

On Active Service Giving Wings to Words

There is emphasis in this capital that the man-in-the-street should entertain no misconceptions about the present temporary lull in the national campaign of political leaders. In fact, there are now intense activities at the headquarters in Ottawa of all political parties in preparing for one of the most furious political campaigns in Canada's political history, judging by certain developments and gossip. However, one report seems to show clearly that the real fireworks, as far as certain top men of various political parties are concerned, will not be set off by them in person until after the Victory Loan drive has ended on May 12 and the San Francisco Conference has advanced considerably. Premier King has hinted that the San Francisco Conference will keep him occupied for about a month, more or less; Hon. John Bracken's personal campaign will await most likely the end of the Victory Loan Drive; M.J. Caldwell has been reported to extend his political tour of the country, probably around May 21; as a start to be made in this direction; John Blackmore will be leading his Social Credit forces most likely earlier into political battle than the others. In other words, it is forecast along Parliament Hill that the actual heat of the national leaders of the bigger parties will not be put on until about the middle of May or even later. Another report indicates that, after the general election, the new Parliament is scheduled to meet on August 6 but it should be noted that this date was set in the proclamation when the writs fixing the general election for June 11 were issued following
