OLD MAN TURNS OVER HIS POSSESSIONS TO SON, IS CHARGED WITH VAGRANCY

One of the most apparent flagrant cases of ingratitude ever to come before a court, came before Magistrate F. W. Walker in police court at Walkerton in Bruce County on Friday morning last, when a father who had reached the status of an octogenarian, was arraigned in court on charge of vagrancy, after it is alleged he had turned over all his possessions to his son, and the latter's wife refused to allow him to enter their home, the result being that the aged father was found roaming the streets of that lakeside town without any visible means of support and was arrested by the Chief of Police Robinson on a charge of vagrancy.

The story is told as follows by the Walkerton Times:

On coming before Magistrate Walker on Friday morning last the evidence submitted by the defendant at the hearing, revealed that this man who had seen eighty summers and four score winters put into history, had, like old Blind King Lear, who was so pathetically portrayed by Shakespeare as the most glaring sample of this ingratitude his heir and successor, in being kicked out of doors, and compelled to smell his way to Dover, as the great English bard so graphically describes it, so this father, now-old and gray is given the run around by an ungrateful son's wife and lands in the cooler on a vagrancy charge. It was none other than Robert Burns, Scotland's national poet, who said that "Man's Ingratitude to Man Makes Countless Thousands Mourn," so, while it isn't on record that any flood or tears were shed in the police court here, yet the circumstances were pathetic enough to have made any but a marble statue weep. And as there is apparently no law on the statute books now that will compel an offspring who has got all his parents' patrimony, to shelter and provide for his benevolent father for the rest of his days, yet in the final analysis, when the Judge of judges sums matters up at the end of the road, he will hear the words, "Depart thee from Me, thou ungrateful being, pass into that spot reserved for thee by the devil and his angels, for thou hast committed the sin of ingratitude, one of the most unpardonable of any written."

As the aged man said he had friends in Meaford, who would afford him food and shelter if he could only reach that North Grey town, Magistrate Walker, in the goodness of his heart and out of sympathy for this apparently flimflamed octogenarian, advanced the old gentleman sufficient funds to make the journey in comfort.
