Hello Homemakers! There's an abundance of onions yet in many places. Only a year ago we were begging one onion from any of the neighbours. Too bad, we can't store them readily. The best that we can do is to keep them in a cool, dry, dark place. Use them often in soups, gravies, meat dishes, salads, and hot vegetable combinations.

ONION SOUP

3 onions, 3 tbsps. baking fat, 3 pts. beef stock, 3 tbsps. grated cheese, pepper and salt, 2 tbsps. chopped parsley, 1/2 loaf stale bread, (1/2 clove garlic if desired).
 Slice onions and put them in stew pot with fat. Stir and fry until brown. Add beef stock, boil ten mins., skim, season; then add parsley and garlic. Cut or break bread into small pieces and dry in oven a few mins. Sprinkle bread with cheese. Serve cheese-crumbs on top of soup.

ONION SAUCE

1/2 cup minced onion, 3 tbsps. fat, 3 tbsps. flour, 1 1/2 cups beef stock, 1 tsp. minced parsley.
 Cook onion with fat until slightly brown. Stir in the flour, then add the stock and parsley beef.

STUFFED ONIONS

6 medium onions, 1/2 cup chopped ham, 1/2 cup bread crumbs, 1/2 cup milk, pepper, 1 tsp. salt, 1 tsp. fat.
 After removing a slice from the top of each, parboil onions until almost done. Drain and remove the centres, leaving six cups. Chop entire part of onion and combine it with ham and crumbs. Add seasoning and refill the onion cups. Place them in a baking dish, cover

with crumbs, add milk and bake in an electric oven at 425 degrees about 15 minutes.

BAKED MINCED STEAK

1 1/2 lbs. minced beef (round steak), 2 cups bread soaked in milk, 1 small onion minced, 1 tsp. baking fat, 2 eggs, 4 hard-cooked eggs, 1 cup of tomatoes, 1/2 cup sliced onion, salt, pepper and 1/2 tsp. ginger.
 Have the meat put through the grinder twice. Add the bread, onion, seasonings and two beaten eggs. Mix together and put mixture into greased loaf pan. Arrange the hard-cooked eggs end to end on the meat. Pour over a sauce composed of tomatoes, 1/2 cup sliced onions and baking fat. Bake in electric oven 350 degrees for 1 1/2 hours.

TAKE A TIP

1. If you want to reheat muffins, put them in a paper bag and twist the top slightly; put in a preheated electric oven at 300 degrees—turn off the heat and let them warm through. Very dry ones may become moist by putting a few slices of raw potato in the bag, too, and leaving the bottom element turned on.
2. Don't neglect to make a small "turnover" when you bake a pie. Your small son will think he's pretty important with his own pie.
3. It's not necessary to boil fresh maple syrup before you bottle it. But it should be put in sterilized jars and sealed, using rubber bands dipped in baking soda and hot water. Jars should be stored in a dark cool place.
4. Try making candy with shortening instead of butter. We made some for a bazaar and it sold like hot cakes. A fudge recipe and maple flavouring was used.

W.P.T.B. QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

- Q.—We recently purchased several fruit trees, evergreen trees and other nursery stock from a Nursery Firm. We have since noticed similar stock on display at various firms but at much lower prices. Is there not some price ceiling on merchandise of this kind?
 A.—The price of plants, trees, shrubs and other nursery stock are exempt from Board regulations. It is very difficult, if not impossible, to fix maximum prices on products which depend on so many variable conditions such as weather, yield of products resulting from the labour involved, etc. the price of seeds, however, is controlled by a Board order.
- Q.—Last December I bought a glass double boiler being told it was one of the best made also guaranteed. I paid \$5.65 for it. Finding a flaw I returned it and was told it would be replaced. Now they say I did not pay that price, it was a poor grade merchandise and that it cannot be replaced. Is there any way to protect the public in matters of this kind?
 A.—Yes, if you paid \$5.95 for first class merchandise and later

find you did not receive it, then you are being overcharged. as you have given us the name of the store where you made this purchase we will investigate for you.

Q.—Which coupons are we to use for canning sugar this year?
 A.—On March 15 two additional preserves coupons were declared valid for the purchase of canning sugar. On May 17 another 8 coupons will become valid. On July 19 another 10 coupons will be declared valid for this purpose. These will be coupons 4 to 13 on the spare page of "P" coupons in your ration book. Each coupon is good for the purchase of 1/2 a lb. of sugar. Each ration book holder is entitled to 10 lbs. of canning sugar this season. For those who do not need sugar for home canning these extra coupons may be used for the purchase of jams, jellies, maple syrup, canned fruit, etc.

MUST HEED RUSSIAN ACHIEVEMENTS

"The time has come when the church must take communism seriously," said a report on "Church Life and Work" adopted by the Toronto and Kingston synod of the Presbyterian Church in Canada last week.

"Russia's amazing achievements in the war have astounded the nations; and have proved that there is within communism a spiritual as should have told her people what

well as a material power," the report went on.

The report was presented by the committee convener, Rev. Frank Lawson of Kitchener. He said it was the business of the church to guide the Christian man in his thinking "and tell him of the things that constitute a Christian society and a just social order."

"The battlefield will shift one of these days from that between nations to that between classes. And the old issues of an earlier day will be fought with increased fury," he said.

"What are some of these ideologies: state control; free enterprise; socialism and communism. The last-named is certain to become a world force. In our generation communism may emerge as a new proletarian religion," said the report.

"We recall the long period of intensive propaganda that preceded the outbreak of war and the mental complexes formed in the public mind against Moscow and all that she stood for. This campaign was directed by so-called intellectuals, the press and interested parties. And the church was silent.

"We recall too, that national socialism was interpreted to us by the same agents. The wolf was dressed in sheep's clothing. The dictators made the trains run on time. They were flares that would nations; and have proved that there is within communism a spiritual as should have told her people what

they meant in terms of the moral and spiritual life of man.

"Soon, very soon, a flood of restrained emotions will be released against communism. That is, just as soon as some of our dictators have been destroyed. There is a powerful ferment at work in the Canadian mind against Russia that will soon find expression in the press and on the platform.

Hats Off to Russia

"Already one great church has, by a methodic and persistent policy, poisoned millions of minds against one of our great Allies. And, we believe, imputed to her sinister motives and ambitions that do not belong to the Soviet.

"If Russia has been successful in the application of state medicine we should be willing to learn from her. If she has succeeded in removing forever the idle men from the market-place, then we should discover her secret. If she has established justice between man and man; given cake to none and bread to all; applied the teaching of Jesus' parable of the rich man and Lazarus more realistically than professedly Christian nations, then let us take off our hats to her.
