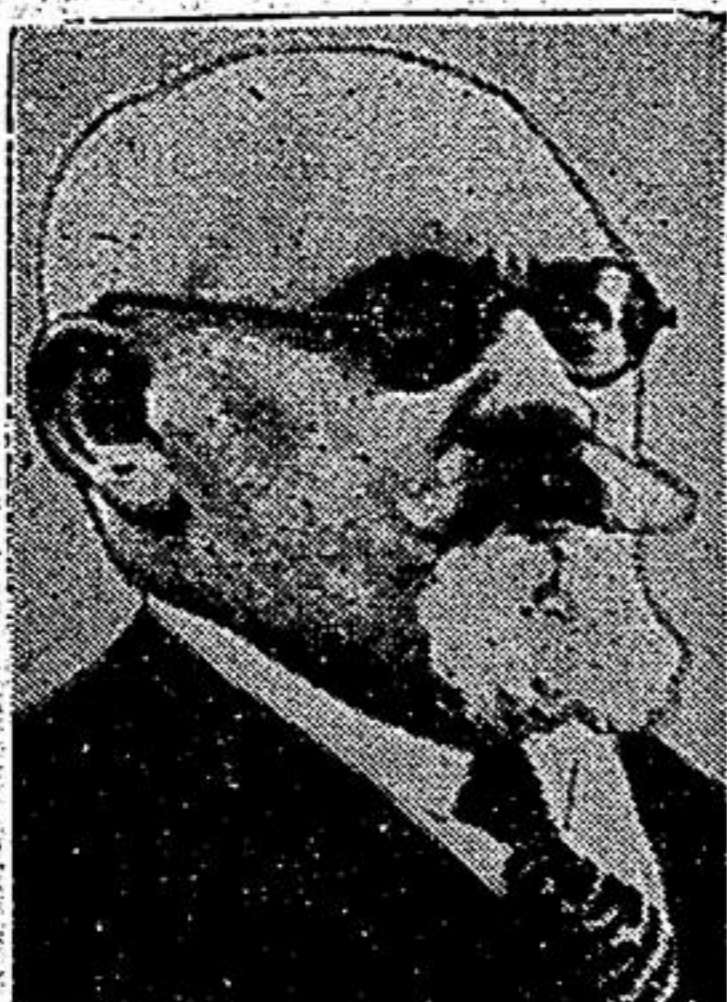


**ANOTHER HIGH HOLSTEIN RECORD YORK COUNTY BLOOD LINES**

The members and others interested in the Maple Cattle Breeders' Association will be pleased to know that a half sister of three of the Holstein bulls purchased by the Club for artificial insemination work has just completed a record that ranks amongst the top records of the Dominion. As reported last week by the London Free Press, Loneln Texal Happy a five-year-old owned by Mr. Berry of Wilton Grove has produced 30,711 lbs. of milk testing 3.59% with 1101 lbs. of fat which would make up almost 1400 lbs. of butter.

This cow sired by the fourteen year old Lonela Texal Fayne owned by Geo. G. Jackson of Downsview, the sire of three of the bulls in the Maple Club. Incidentally there is considerable activity these days at the southern limits of Maple village where the members are having "bees" to renovate the building purchased by the association to house the bulls. A number of farmers met at the Wilbert Jennings at Temperanceville last Wednesday night to have the plan outlined to them by president G.W. Keffer of Maple and Agricultural Representative, W. M. Cockburn.

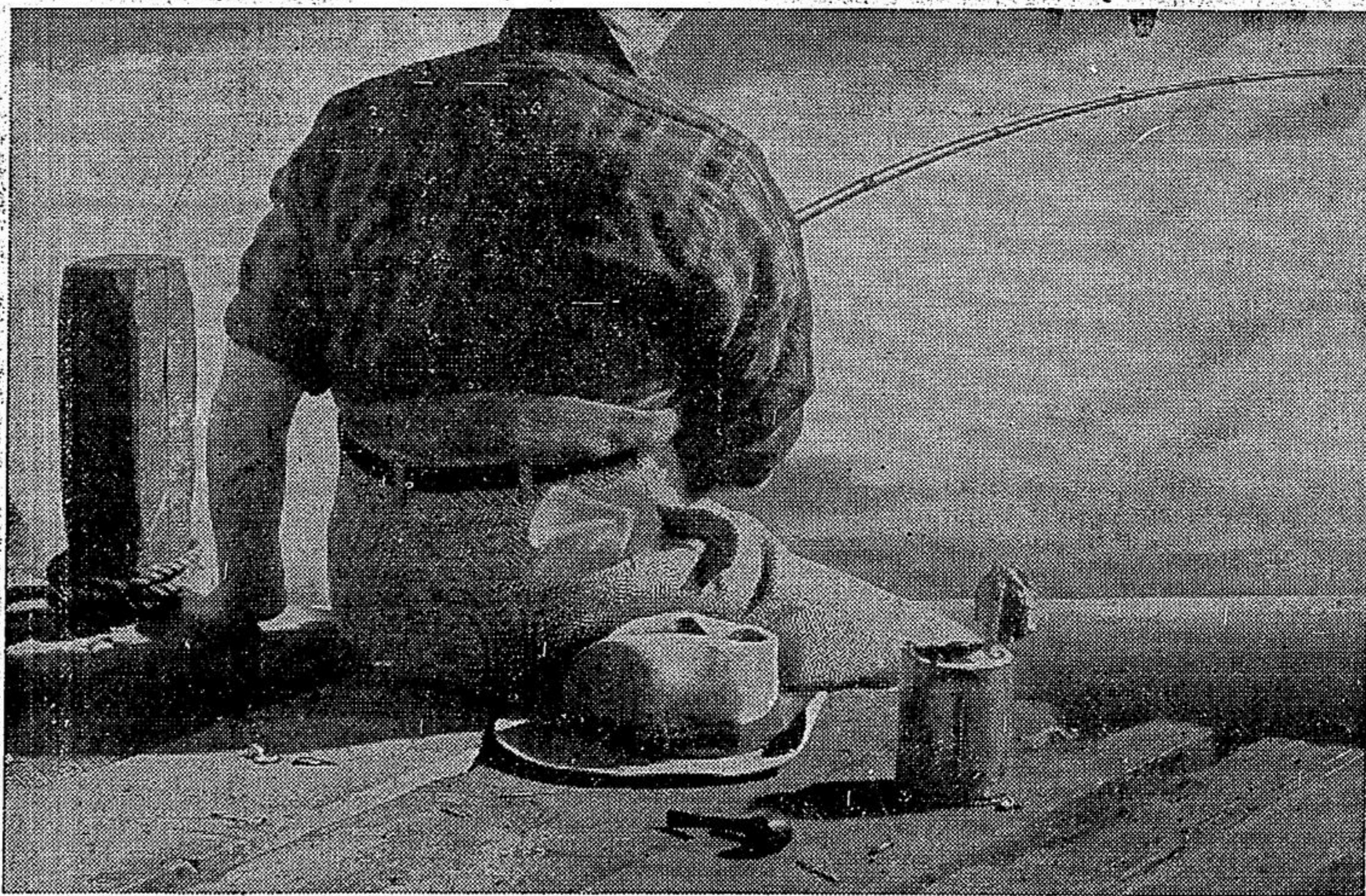
