DON MORRISON, D.F.C., D.F.M.

After five years in the R.C.A.F., Flt. Lieut. Don Morrison, D.F.C., D.F.M., is asking York East electors for a chance to a seat as a member of the House of Commons. An early graduate of the Commonwealth training plan, Morrison went overseas as a sergeant pilot. His career includes 150 flights over enemy territory, six German planes downed, six probables and four Nazi crafts damaged. He lost a leg in combat and spent a year in a Nazi prison camp. After his exchange, Morrison's organizing ability was put to use as an instructor for the R.C.A.F. in Canada. He was honorably discharged this year and is running as a Liberal candidate in the federal election June 11.

84 CONVICTIONS AGAINST BREAKERS OF SELECTIVE SERVICE

A total of 84 convicted during March, 1945, of failing to comply with National Selective Service Regulations, according to a statement issued today by Arthur MacNamara, Director of National Selective Service. During the month 93 new prosecutions were begun in addition to 200 cases being carried over from the previous month. In February, 79 new prosecutions were started. The March judgments included 15 against employers, most of whom were found guilty of engaging workers without permits. Of 42 employees convicted, a majority were charged with leaving employment without giving notice of separation, quitting "designated" high priority work without Selective Service permission, or failing to accept high priority work when referred by a Selective Service Officer. Twenty-seven conscientious objectors were convicted of failing to follow a direction to report to an alternative service work camp.

Probably we shall have late crops of other commodities and farm stuff to more than compensate for the early loss, so do not worry brother. Mrs. Josh says I am forever worrying, so you see I am sort of lecturing my own shortcomings.
