Big P.E.I. Guernsey Breeder Takes Over Forsyth Farm

Mr. P. A. Horne from Prince Edward Island, has rented the G.M. Forsyth farm for a year, and landed in Claremont last week with his family, two train carloads of household effects, and some of the finest Guernsey cattle in the Dominion.

Mr. Horne has disposed of his 100-acre farm near Charlottetown and travelled the 1500 miles east for his health. The Forsyth farm was recommended to him by an Ontario friend, and the deal was quickly closed by telegraph and telephone.

The new tenant has had a varied career in farming, having been in the horse buying trade in Moose Jaw on a large scale for a time, and in silver fox farming. He has a keen eye for prize horse flesh, and has shown at most of the big exhibitions in the country, in both the heavy and fancy classes, being a top-notcher in hackneys.

Although born on the Island, Mr. Horne has travelled very extensively, both south and west. Mrs. Horne is a dog fancier, and has some prize fox terriers, some imported by herself personally from the old country.

Pride of the Horne Guernsey herd is "Flying Horse Demon," an imported bull from the Flying Horse Farms, famed United States ranch. Along with the big fellow are some of the choicest cows of the breed.

It is hinted in a report in Ottawa that changed conditions may bring a number of orderly transfers of men and women from work presently connected with war undertakings to peacetime enterprises, though there is a stern warning that these changes will not be made in the coming weeks or months in any quick or sudden moves but in rather slow or careful actions as the nation's economy is gradually transferred to a peacetime basis from a wartime foundation.

Liberal Candidates Discuss Issues

The issues in the federal and provincial elections were presented by W. E. N. Sinclair, K.C. and Dr. W. H. Gifford, at a Liberal rally in the Community Hall at Claremont on Tuesday night. Allan Giles, Claremont was the chairman.

Mr. Sinclair in his address dealt with certain phases of the federal campaign making special reference to the legislation provided for returning veterans and the betterment of agricultural conditions. He also outlined the accomplishments of the federal government in the prosecution of the war. Special attention was given by the speaker to the plans made by the King Government for the reconstruction period and the rehabilitation of the members of the armed forces. He also referred to the problem of re-employment of returned service personnel and the improving of markets for farm produce.

Dr. Gifford in his address outlined the aims of the Liberal Party in the province and dealt with the general issues of the election.

Other speakers who addressed the meeting were W. H. Moore, F. M. Chapman and James Heffering.

TO THE ELECTORS OF ONTARIO RIDING

Realizing that prosperity for farmers is essential for the prosperity of all other classes, the Federal Government has made plans for the improvements of agricultural conditions and the opportunity for greater returns in the industry. Seeing the necessity of a greater market for farm products, the Government has set as its goal a sixty per cent increase in Canada's export trade. This will ensure markets for surplus farm products at more favourable prices. To protect the exporters the Government has passed the Export Credit Insurance Act to do two things (1) to insure exporters against loss and (2) to make loans to foreign governments to enable them to buy.

In addition the Government has extended many of the contracts for the export of farm commodities for periods after the war, which will maintain markets at good prices. To protect farmers and to maintain prices for them the Government has provided floor prices for their products. Further provision has been made for loans with low interest rates for building and re-modelling farm homes and for improvement and development of farms with the Agricultural Prices Support Act of 1944 in force, the prosperity of the farmers is secured after the war under the management of the Agricultural Prices Support Board. By the removal of import duties and war exchange taxes from farm implements and repairs, twine and cream separators a saving to purchasers of these articles has been secured.

Thus the Government has aided the farmers and will aid them when returned to power. A completed programme is worked out for the reconstruction years that lie ahead. The Liberal Government which has handled our affairs during the war years is the only Government capable of continuing and carrying out the plans now made. Mr. Bracken with his inexperience in Federal matters should not be considered. A continuation of prosperity and well being for all can only be secured by the return to office on June 11th of the Government which has so well managed affairs during the war for the farmers as well as all other classes in the country.
