heard in North York.


Al Harvey of radio fame, formerly of the Club Top Hat, and famous for his acts in the Al and Bob Harvey show will entertain at 8:15 p.m.

When heavy losses developed, Doss climbed to the top of an escarpment and despite constant Jap fire he remained there until he had lowered all the wounded men

**20th ANNUAL Y.P. CONVENTION
OF M.B.C. CHURCH**

(Held over from last week.)

Stouffville young people were amongst the 350 who attended the Twentieth Annual Young People's Convention of the Mennonite Brethren in Christ held in the Toronto Bible College on Victoria Day. The report of the local delegate, Donald Pugh, was amongst the best given. Some 28 societies were represented as far north as Manitoulin Island, west to Port Elgin and east to Coborne.

During the last year membership has increased 3%, while an increase of 16% was shown in the number of meetings held. Total offerings increased 11%, the highest in history. Offerings for foreign missions showed an increase of 45% over last year and 66% over two years ago. One new society was organized. Gormley society reported the highest attendance, with an average of 65.

The day's activities were under the direction of Reg. Tompkins, president, Listowel with T. A. Warden, London, as secretary.

Dr. Charles Sperber, a Czechoslovakian who was serving on an Allied merchant ship when captured by the Nazis and now safe in Britain, says he was in 15 different camps and that "the concentration or extermination camp at Auschwitz, Upper Silesia, was by far the worst, much worse even than Buchenwald," where he also was a prisoner.
