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Only 8 in Favor of Plan For School Areas

About 45 ratepayers attended a public meeting at Vandorf to discuss the township school area plan. Many school sections were not represented. Inspector O. M. McKillop who outlined the details told the Markham Township Council in advising them that nothing further would be done in Markham this year to advance the school area plan. When a vote was taken at Vandorf by Deputy Reeve Lorne P. Evans, 16 voted against and eight were in favor. Mr. McKillop said.

Inspector McKillop pointed out there were 60 school officials in Whitchurch with 15 schools, each having three trustees and a secretary-treasurer. A board of five to be elected by the ratepayers annually might be established and bring about uniformity in equipment, purchasing and general policy he said.

As the present system stands there are some schools who supply text books free, some schools have the services of a music supervisor and some schools do neither, he stated.

It was a matter entirely for the ratepayers to decide and the department of education would not interfere, he said.

Councillor Ed Logan thought that many who might vote for the plan didn't understand the matter and that the ratepayers were not yet ready for the question.

Councillor L. J. Harper thought it would be better to poll the individual school sections and let each one decide for themselves.

Getting a really representative meeting would be difficult.

Deputy Reeve Evans said council stood ready to be guided by the wishes of the school section, but were taking no lead in the matter although all had their own opinions.

"Although the meeting was small, in view of the opinions of those present, who were a fair cross section of the township, I don't think the plan would have carried with a bigger meeting either," a township official said.

It is understood a further meeting will be held in the fall.

The morning of the Clinic, doctors and nurses come for miles, to give time and energy without pay, as do the floats, the local Red Cross kitchen workers, and the office staff. The members of the Lions club are organized to help with the work and expense of the undertaking, and a number are donors. Many more individual volunteers offered to assist than could be used.

Dr. Innis Macdonald has worked unceasingly in Clinics and out of Clinics to make this a success. A great deal of clerical work must be done between Clinics. All this is done that blood may be on hand whenever needed by our men in the services.

Why do we need MORE NEW DONORS? At stated times, donors are given a rest, before being called on again. Sometimes illness or work makes giving impossible. Some who were donors now are in the army. Many reasons make it necessary to have a steady flow of new donors to fill in the ranks—to have a large enough clinic to make the set-up here worth while.

If you are between the ages of 18 and 60, come to the United Church between 8:45 and 12 on Thursday morning, June 21st. For breakfast no eat, any fats—no bacon, no cream, no whole milk, no butter, and no eggs. You can eat toast and bread without butter, and you can have jams, marmalades, fruits fresh and canned, and syrup. Tea and coffee are all right without cream or whole milk.
