Brother of Mrs. R. Ellicott Dead

A lifelong farmer in Ontario County, James Arthur Stephenson suffered a heart attack and passed away at the family residence, 6th Concession Scott, on Tuesday, May 29th, in his 70th year. The deceased had been in failing health for some time. His wife was the former Mildred White of Greenwood.

The son of the late John Stephenson and Sarah Ann Platten, Mr. Stephenson was born on Scugog Island on February 22nd, 1876. During his lifetime he farmed between Oshawa and Whitby and later in Pickering Township and for the past twelve years in Scott Township. A member of the United Church, he was a former member of the Masonic Order.

In 1901 he married Miss Mildred White, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lorenzo White, of Greenwood, who predeceased him in 1940. Left to mourn his death are two daughters Mrs. Levi Norton (Ethel) of Uxbridge and Mrs. Harper (Edith) at home and three sons, Elmer, of Whitby, Rex, of Toronto and Oscar with the R.C.A.F. at Sydney, N.S. Also surviving are three sisters, Mrs. H. G. Wilson, of Columbus, Mrs. Charles Harris of Orono, and Mrs. Randal Ellicott, of Brougham and two brothers, Thomas E. Stephenson, of Oshawa and Ernest A. Stephenson, of Oshawa. He was also predeceased by a brother George, of Pickering and a sister, Mrs. George Thurman (Hannah) of Oshawa.

INSPECT COUNTY RUST, GRUB AREAS

The Agricultural Committee of Ontario County Council visited areas where rust has been prevalent.

Many good ranches in Reach and Uxbridge townships have been attacked during the past season, by white grub, the sod being destroyed to the extent where no grass is growing, whatsoever, this year on the affected areas.

It was the opinion of the Committee that, where possible, these areas should be diked and reseeded to pasture mixtures, using a high percentage of clovers in the mixtures. Sweet Clover was also recommended in the mixture in order that new sod could be established as soon as possible.

Many farmers have experienced heavy losses from rust during the past few years. In many localities buckthorn and wild barberry, is quite common in fence rows, and these two shrubs are hosts to red rust during the latter part of May and June. The rust spores then leave the barberry and are blown to grain crops where great damage results.

It is recommended that fence rows be cleared of these shrubs to prevent the spreading of rust. Some farmers have had good success hiring a bulldozer to completely remove the fence rows where shrubs and undergrowth are thick. By this means fence rows can be cultivated, keeping down these shrubs. Other farmers have already trimmed out fence rows and are endeavouring to spray new growth with chemical weed killers.
