## Employs Bulldozer to Level Farm Land

Also Squelchs Fire When Tractor Bursts into Flame

Mr. Harry Newman who has acquired considerable farm land in the Brougham area is employing a bulldozer on his property just a mile east of the village on No. 7 highway to level a field which would otherwise be unworkable by reason of its steep hills and gulleys. We understand the cost of work on this field will be \$500.

The big caterpillar monster was called from its levelling job last week to put out a fire when a tractor freshly gassed up, burst into flame. The tractor was rolled over three times, and dirt heaped over it by the bulldozer, completely dousing the flames. The driver of the tractor, Vernon Short, escaped with minor cuts and bruises.

Mr. Newman is making extensive improvements to his two farms near Brougham, including new houses, and complete new stabling in the barns. Norman Bunker, contractor is rushing work on the stabling on the south place this week, installing complete steel stabling throughout with stalls for twenty-one cows, and 10 box stalls. One of these is being prepared for the prize Durham bull which Mr. Newman recently imported from Scotland and which is being held at the Quebec border pending shipment here. Mr. Stanley Dix is the farm manager on the one place and Mr. Chambers overseer on the other.

### THE WEED CONTROL ACT SAYS:

#### CLAUSE 5:

Every occupant of land, or if the land is unoccupied, the owner shall destroy all weeds designed noxious by the regulations as often in every year as is sufficient to prevent the ripening of their seeds.

#### CLAUSE 23:

Any person who contravenes any of the provisions of this Act or refuses to obey any lawful order of an Inspector, given under authority of this Act, shall incur a penalty of not less than \$10.00, nor more than \$50.00 for every such offence.
