### DO YOU KNOW

All field crops in Canada except hay, clover and pastures at the end of June this year indicated a lower yield per acre than at the end of June, 1944. A merchant in Welland was recently fined \$35 and costs for selling canned goods 2c. per can above the ceiling price. In 1939 there were only 43 shippings in Canada but in 1943 there were 87. The present weekly ration of 7 oz. of butter per week is achieved by

making 7 butter coupons valid over an 8 week period that is one week is skipped at the end of every seven. Domestic sales of farm implements jumped 84.7 per cent. in 1944 over 1943. W.P.T.B. has issued directives to manufacturers of glucose and dextrose in the hope that an increase in corn sweeteners would aid the industrial shortage of sugar. Country general store sales have been increasing in recent months.

All men experienced in home building or in producing building materials, who are not now working in either of these industries, are urged to apply to the nearest office of the National Employment Service immediately.

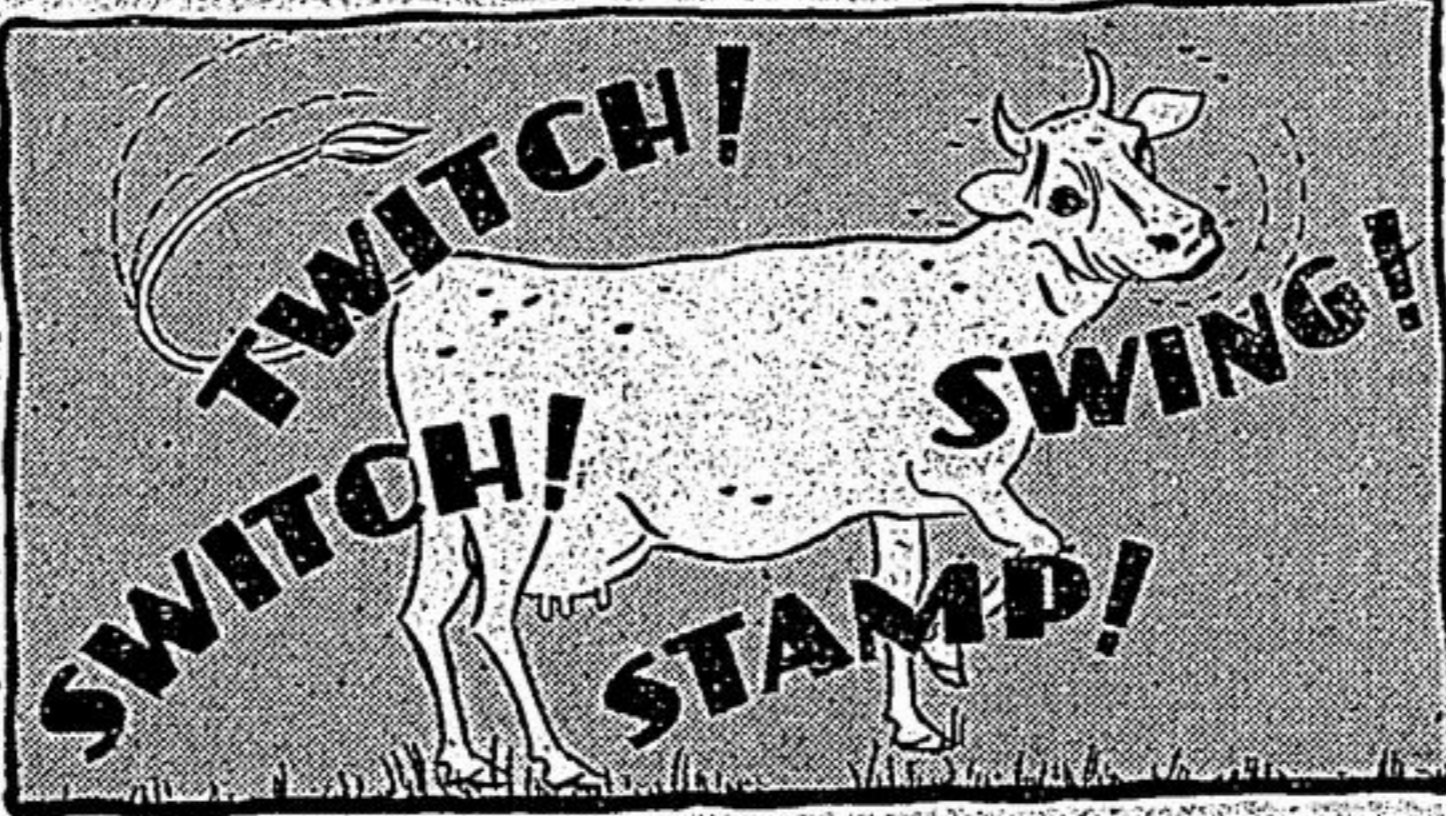
Men experienced at home building or producing supplies, if now in other essential work, will be given permits to work at jobs which will assist the house building program.
