## Young Farmers Study Crop Problems

Eighty-five enthusiastic York County farmers attended an interesting and highly educational meeting sponsored by the York County Crop Improvement Association at Don Head Farms, Richmond Hill and Leitchcroft Farms, Langstaff, to study and discuss the characteristics and the damage of the rather serious infestation of Loose Smut in the wheat fields of York County this year. Located on these two farms were demonstration plots each with 50 different varieties of fall wheat that are tested by the Dept. of Field Husbandry, O.A.C.

Prof. W. H. Waddell of the O.A.C. who is supervising extensive experimental tests to select and introduce new winter wheat varieties for Ontario that possess greater disease resistance, more winter hardiness and improved milling qualities, was speaker. Prof. Waddell discussed numerous noteworthy observations of the different varieties at each test plot and later led a very enlightening discussion of the provincial grain situation in general.

Mr. Frank Marritt, Keswick, President of the York County Crop Improvement Association, gave an excellent demonstration on the hot water method of treating seed wheat to control Loose Smut. In addition he outlined the merits and limitations of this very delicate treatment, particularly stressing the necessity of proper equipment and faultless thermometers to maintain the water at the required temperatures.

(Continued from Front Page) certain lines such proposals of conversion may not prove practical, or at least may be quite difficult. More over there were also discussions about creating industrial councils representative of labor, management and government, with these problems as well as others concerning the future of war workers being under deep consideration at this moment in order to find a proper solution in the common interests of all. It must be pointed out that the Canadian Government is represented in Eire (Ireland) by a High Commissioner and the same is true of Eire's representation in this nation, with this being emphasized in regard to the report that Premier de Valera had stated in Dublin that Eire is a republic within the British Commonwealth of Nations in so far as external policy was concerned. In other words, Eire's representative in Ottawa and Canada's representative in Dublin have the same status as the other High Commissioners between the various parts of the Empire.

There is much comment backstage in Ottawa now about the very little reaction caused by the "hints" dropped by Premier King of the possibility that a Canadian could be named as the next Governor-General since the Earl of Athlone was about ready to leave in the early autumn, or late summer. It had been expected that such an appointment would have aroused considerable reaction in Canada but it seems now along Parliament Hill that little interest had been excited by such a prospect, with this providing much comment in the capital. A reminder of the coming departure of Canada's Governor-General is the report that the lady-in-waiting to the Princess Alice, Miss Vera Grenfell, has returned to England, escorting the two granddaughters of their Excellencies, Ann and Elizabeth Abel-Smith who are joining their parents in England after living in Ottawa ever since the start of the European war. Canada's rise as a Power in world affairs is emphasized again and again in this capital as distinguished men from other nations come here. With the departure of Baron Silvercruys, the new Belgium Ambassador to Canada, His Excellency A. Paternotte de la Vallée, has been extremely busy in Ottawa with interviews, conferences, etc. At the same time, three well-known Australian officials have come here to study Canadian planning methods for rebuilding purposes and architectural design. Since a limited number of cattle shows have been held in Canada this year and "show beef" has been sold at high prices, this being allowed by regulations under certain conditions of "show beef" bought at fairs or exhibitions, a report in Ottawa indicates that Wartime Prices and Trade Board officials are checking these sales of "show beef" in some Eastern Canadian cities on account of the large quantities of such "show beef" said to be available.
